MESSAGE FROM THE ADJUTANT GENERAL

December 31, 2001

Dear Governor Glendening:

I am pleased to submit our fiscal year 2001 annual report for the Maryland Military Department, which incorporates the Maryland National Guard, State Operations and Maryland Emergency Management Agency. As you well know, the past year was marked by horrific terrorism on September 11th. Like you, I have felt so very proud of the Maryland National Guard's quick and competent response.

The Maryland National Guard (MDNG) remains a key player in the economic viability of Maryland, as our economic impact totalled \$183.2 million. The ratio of federal dollars spent in Maryland to state dollars invested is strong at nearly 15 to 1 for the Military Department.

As this report summarizes, MDNG continues to provide employment and educational opportunities to Marylanders, while remaining ready to serve our fellow citizens at home or abroad. We feel proud of our contribution to the state's economic development posture.

Fiscal year 2001 was a hectic one for the Maryland National Guard (MDNG). After the September 11, 2001 attack on America, the MDNG mobilized more than 2,000 men and women. Within hours, members of the 115th Military Police Battalion, with units in Salisbury and Parkville, were on the scene at the Pentagon. Seven units were deployed for homeland defense in the United States. Also, more than 170 Guard members handled airport security duties at three Maryland airports. In addition, roughly 200 citizens-soldiers and citizen-airmen provided force protection or security to numerous Guard installations.

In keeping with a 367-year-old tradition, Maryland's citizen-soldiers and airmen again this past year successfully responded to our state's and nation's needs. In August 2001, the MDNG sent soldiers to serve as a peace-keeping force in the US zone of Bosnia-Herzeogovina. Beginning in August 2001, the 29th Infantry Division (Light) Stabilization Force 10 Task Force Eagle deployed to Bosnia. Major General H Steven Blum, a Marylander, is the Multi-National Division North Commander for this mission. This is the largest deployment for the 29th Infantry Division (Light) since World War II. The 29th Division leads a task force of citizen-soldiers from throughout the country as well as foreign countries.

The Maryland Air National Guard (MDANG) also enjoyed a productive and successful year. Airmen deployed in defense of the nation and continued to serve on active duty. Maryland airmen deployed to Al Jaber, Kuwait in Southwest Asia to patrol the "no-fly" zone in support of Operation Southern Watch. The Maryland Air National Guard's 175th Wing had a number of successful missions, including Operation Snowbird 01 at Davis Monthan Air Force Base in Arizona. There, the Wing's 104th Fighter Squadron was the first A-10 unit named "Most Professional Deployed Unit for 2001." The Maryland Air National Guard's 135th Airlift Group continues to lead the way in conversion to the state-of-the-art C-130J aircraft. The 135th functioned and participated in the "Total-Force" Operational Test & Evaluation in which it trained 63 aircrew members. The C-130J Joint Users Group hosted a worldwide conference attended by 160 persons from seven different countries.

It was another busy year for the MDNG Honor Guard, which you and the General Assembly established in 1998. In fiscal year 2001, the MDNG Honor Guard performed 2,412 veterans' funerals and rendered honors at many other events around the state. Since its inception, the MDNG Honor Guard has performed nearly 6,500 veterans' burials.

The Centennial Celebration of the Maryland National Guard's Fifth Regiment Armory in June 2001 marked a tremendously historical event. It allowed us to share in the history of this venerable building, which is truly a landmark in the City of Baltimore. The Military Ball, held as part of the Centennial Celebration, provided a glimpse into the past, present and future of the Maryland Army and Air National Guard.

We continue to enhance our community service and education initiatives. We have expanded our Distributive Training Technology Program to 14 armories and will continue seeking statewide coverage. The Maryland Emergency Management Agency and the Maryland and State Police also use our distance learning centers. Our Partners In Education program continues to expand, as all 16 Maryland community colleges are now full partners in the 50 percent tuition waiver program, along with nine public universities and two private colleges. The Partners In Education program is invaluable in helping Maryland attain better-educated Guard members to serve its citizens, and so is the state tuition assistance program that you and the General Assembly have so generously supported.

Our youth programs also have flourished. The Freestate ChalleNGe Academy has now graduated 1,337 students, of whom 71 percent have earned their GED. More than 75 percent have entered college or joined the military upon graduation. Our About Face! drug demand reduction program for at-risk middle school age children has grown from four to 13 schools located across Maryland. This program, involving parents, students and educators, is aimed at preventing problems in children's lives before they start. The state funding supported by you and provided by the General Assembly continues to be an excellent investment in Maryland's youth.

We thank you for your strong support and leadership and look forward to serving you and the citizens of Maryland in the coming year.

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

Captain Alfred Rascon, a Medal of Honor recipient and Maryland resident, was sworn into the Maryland Army National Guard by Major General James F. Fretterd, the adjutant general on Saturday, January 12, 2002. Currently the director of the U.S. Selective Service System, Captain Rascon received the nation's highest military award on February 8, 2000 from President Bill Clinton. He earned the Medal of Honor for his heroic action as a 21-year-old medic on March 16, 1966 when his unit was attacked by North Vietnamese troops. He ignored his own wounds and withering enemy fire to treat three men, saving two of them. The son of a Mexican immigrant, Captain Rascon was not yet a U.S. citizen when he went to Vietnam and engaged in the action that earned him the nation's highest military honor.

Along with Lieutenant General Russell C. Davis, Chief, National Guard Bureau, and roughly 30 civic leaders, he visited Stabilization Force 10 troops in late November 2001.



Economic Impact

The primary purpose of the Maryland Military Department, which oversees the Maryland Army and Air National Guard and Maryland Emergency Management Agency, is to contribute to the security of the nation and the state. While doing so, it also has a major impact on the State of Maryland.

Financial support to the Maryland National Guard and Maryland Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) totaled over \$183.2 million in fiscal year 2001. Funds are received from the

Department of the Army, the Department of the Air Force, State of Maryland and the Department of Defense for the Freestate ChalleNGe Academy. State funds cover the salaries of state regular employees, maintenance and repair of MDNG facilities. Additionally, the state provides cooperative funding for the Freestate ChalleNGe program and tuition assistance for Guard members.

Federal support to the Maryland National Guard is significant, as shown on the subse-

quent pages. These expenditures, which have an economic impact in nearly all political subdivisions in Maryland, cover pay and allowances, training, supplies, equipment and construction.

The largest federal expenditures each year are normally in Baltimore County, Harford County and Baltimore City. Due to the location of the Warfield Air National Guard Base, Martin State Airport, in Middle River, and MEMA in Reistertown, Baltimore County's total is the largest in the state. Maryland National Guard units are located in all but four counties-Caroline, Dorchester, St. Mary's and Worcester.

Federal financial support to the Maryland Military Department, including MEMA's federal funds, totaled \$171,697,662 in FY 2001.

Figures listed for the counties without armories represent the salaries paid to Guard members who live in these political subdivisions but serve elsewhere.

Both the Maryland Army and Air National Guard receive federal funds in three basic appropriations:

1. Military Personnel. Includes pay, authorized allowances, uniforms and individual equipment, disability benefits, bonuses and related expenses for personnel in connection with active duty, active duty for training (two-week annual training) and inactive duty training (drill week-ends).

2. Operations and

Maintenance. Includes activities involved in the administration of the National Guard, training units, procurement of organi-

zational equipment, repair parts, services, equipment maintenance and activities in connection with military support to civil authorities. The appropriation also includes all full-time payrolls.

3. Construction. Includes construction and modification and procurement of facilities and necessary items for the National Guard. The federal government does provide funds for construction and/or modification of facilities. When this occurs on state land, the state shares in these costs.







Response to Terrorism After September 11, 2001 Homeland Defense

Both citizen-soldiers and citizen-airmen immediately reacted to the events of September 11, 2001. Within minutes of the airline crashes, the Maryland National Guard Emergency Operations Center, in conjunction with the state's Emergency Operations Center, was operating and responding to calls for assistance. Within weeks, Maryland National Guard members were deployed across the country and across the state defending vulnerable areas. Military police units deployed to the Pentagon and appeared on the scene in less than 12 hours from the initial warning order. MEMA activated the State Emergency Operations Center in response to the September 11, 2001 terrorist attack on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon and coordinated the use of Maryland's resourses to assist New York, Virginia, and the District of Columbia. The Maryland National Guard has worked closely with many state and federal agencies, including the Federal Aviation Administration, the Maryland Aviation Administration and the Maryland Department of Transportation Police, in a coordinated response to this terrible tragedy.





The Maryland National Guard's uniqueness derives from its traditional commitment to the accomplishment of state missions. This was particularly true when the Guard undertook the airport security mission. The following six pages illustrate the scope of the Maryland National Guard's statewide mission. Its federally funded training allows the Guard to react quickly and competently to emergencies.

Maryland Emergency Management Agency

The Maryland Emergency Management Agency has revised completely the State Emergency Operations Plan, which originally was written in 1991. The new plan is streamlined and reflects current emergency management concepts of coordination by emergency support functions.



The Emergency Operations Center located at the MEMA headquarters at the Camp Fretterd Military Reservation in Reisterstown, is the site of state emergency operations during crisis events. This state-of-the-art facility serves many purposes, from hosting meetings and conferences as well as exercises in disaster response sponsored by MEMA.



Military Support to Civil Authorities

Distributive Training Technology

Using its widespread armories, the Maryland National Guard is constructing a multi-purpose statewide network of video-teleconferencing and telecommuting centers. These armory based centers, which are open for public use upon reservation, can be used for taking college courses through distance learning, telecommuting or military training for Guard members. Several colleges in partnership with the Guard offer classes in outlying communities by using our distributive training facilities.

Freestate ChalleNGe Academy

Since 1993, the Maryland National Guard has operated an at-risk youth intervention program for unemployed high school dropouts at Aberdeen Proving Grounds. Focusing on eight components, this 22-week residential program has gained a well-earned reputation for its high passage rate of 71 percent on the General Education Development (GED) or high school equivalency degree. Of the Freestate ChalleNGe Academy's 1,337 graduates, 953 have earned a GED certificate. More than 75 percent of the graduates attend college or vocational-technical school, obtain a job or enter the military. This highly successful program includes a job skills component. Both the state and federal government provide funding for the program. Approximately 25 groups and individuals provide scholarships totaling nearly \$20,000.

About Face!

Targeting middle school-aged youth at risk of drug or alcohol abuse or violence, About Face! provides after school instruction and field trips as well as weeknight classes for parents. This program, funded mostly by foundation grants, is in operation at 13 schools in Allegany County, Baltimore County, Carroll County, Prince George's County and Wicomico County as well as Baltimore City. Parents attend classes in effective parenting, working with staff and trained professionals to improve communication with their children. The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Center at Camp Fretterd Military Reservation is the site of weekend retreats at which youth learn life-coping skills and engage in outdoor activities. About Face! draws praise from principals, counselors, teachers as well as parents, as has been true since the program was established in 1991.

Army Guard Force Structure

The Maryland Army National Guard (MDARNG) is well structured to support both its state and federal missions. The events of September 11, 2001 exemplified the ability of the Guard to meet the challenges of these missions.

As of December 1, 2001, the total work force was 6,390, which consists of traditional Guard members, full-time federal military technicians and active Guard-Reserve (AGR) personnel and civilian employees.

Members of the MDARNG make up five major subordinate commands and the State Area Command Headquarters. Three of the major commands belong to the 29th Infantry Division (Light): 3rd Brigade, 29th Division Support Command and the 29th Aviation Brigade. The two other major commands are the 58th Troop Command and the 70th Regiment (Leadership), a military training academy. These units provide not only a robust combat arms capability to the Army, but also many units critical to state missions, such as military police, engineer, transportation and medical units.

Army Guard World Missions

The Maryland National Guard participated in many overseas training missions. Overseas missions took citizen-soldiers to all corners of the world, including Poland, Egypt, Italy, Germany, Estonia and Israel. These deployments enable the Maryland National Guard members to train abroad with their peers in foreign military forces. Overseas training also serves as an effective recruiting and retention tool.



Education Initiatives

The Maryland National Guard has signed agreements with three private universities along with many state universities and colleges. This past year, the Guard signed agreements with Loyola College, Morgan University, Towson University and the University of Maryland Biotechnology Institute. This program dramatically increases the opportunities for Maryland National Guard members to achieve their educational goals.



This memorial, created by renowned sculptor Hans Schuler, was dedicated originally on Armistice Day 1925 in honor of the Maryland National Guard's Fifth Regiment. It specifically pays tribute to unit members who died during World War I. Situated directly above the main entrance to the Fifth Regiment Armory, a Baltimore City landmark, the memorial has below it on the east side of the door tablets listing the names of the entire roster of the Fifth Regiment just prior to a major reorganization of the Maryland National Guard in support of the war effort in 1917.

Under the auspices of the Maryland Military Monuments Commission, in partnership with the Maryland Department of General Services, the memorial, the two tablets and the distinctive entrance door were restored. Completion of this project occurred just prior to the Centennial Celebration of the Fifth Regiment Armory on June 2, 2001.
