I am pleased to submit the Maryland Military Department's fiscal year 2015 annual report, which incorporates the accomplishments of the Maryland Army National Guard, the Maryland Air National Guard, the Maryland Emergency Management Agency, and the Maryland Defense Force.

The Maryland National Guard continued to support many overseas contingency operations. In addition to supporting operations in Afghanistan, our military personnel have served in Estonia, Horn of Africa, Bosnia & Herzegovina, and on our southwest border with Mexico. In addition, our personnel from all the pillars of our department were mobilized for state service during the civil unrest in Baltimore in late April and early May of this year. The Maryland National Guard was able to mobilize and deploy more than 1,400 members in the first 24 hours and more than 3,000 in 72 hours. This was done with close coordination with MEMA and with the support from the MDDF.

The department remains a solid contributor to the economic strength of Maryland as our fiscal impact totaled \$268 Million. The department's ration of federal dollars spent for each state dollar invested is nearly 23 to 1. We continue to provide employment and education opportunities to Marylanders while providing our citizens an opportunity to serve our state and our nation.

Governor Hogan, the Maryland Military Department remains a "relevant and ready" force, prepared to serve the needs of our state and nation as we continue a new chapter in our long and distinguished history. Thank you for your support.

Future flying mission for the Maryland Air National Guard

The Department of Defense and Air Force have plans to retire the A-10C Thunderbolt II fleet in the near future. The Maryland Air National Guard is committed to maintaining trained and equipped combat forces ready for mobilization, deployment and employment as needed to support our national security objectives. In fiscal year 2018, the Air Force plans for the 175th Wing of the MDANG to divest of the A-10C and will acquire C130-J Hercules aircraft in fiscal year 2019. If the Maryland Air National Guard is left without a flying mission, it could have a major impact to the community.

Transformation of the Maryland Army National Guard

The Maryland Army National Guard will reduce its current authorized strength from 5,013 to 4,675 over the next three years. This is due to the overall reduction in Army forces (Active, Guard, and Reserve) under the Budget Control Act. What will remain after reduction is a fullspectrum force that can meet the needs of the citizens of Maryland for both natural and manmade events. The MDARNG has already transitioned a sizeable portion of its forces from a Battlefield Surveillance Brigade to an Expeditionary Military Intelligence Brigade. The MDARNG will leverage relationships with federal stakeholders (NSA and USCYBERCOM) in order to mutually support the Army's mission and add

value to our soldiers and our communities.

MEMA is updating the State's response plans

The Maryland Emergency Management Agency is in the process of a comprehensive update of all elements of the Maryland Emergency Preparedness Program, including the State Prevention/ Protection Operations Plan, State Response Operations Plan, State Disaster Recovery Operations Plan, and State Mitigation Operations Plan. Additionally, MEMA continues to bolster the Private Sector Integration Program by incorporating businesses, non-profit agencies, and voluntary organizations into the emergency management system as part of MEMA's objective to strengthen a statewide, wholecommunity comprehensive emergency management program.

Assess current capabilities of the MDDF

The Maryland Defense Force is currently conducting a comprehensive assessment of their current



capabilities to ensure that they are properly aligned to support the other pillars of the Military Department. This assessment will help advance credentialing, recruitment needs, and training requirements. It will also improve our ability to respond to request for mission support for the department and the community.

Facilities Master Plan

The organization's priorities continue to evolve in order to address changes in both foreign and domestic missions, force structure, and responsibilities of the Military Department. With these evolutions, improvements to facilities and infrastructure need to keep pace to ensure there is a proper platform from which duties can be performed in support of these priorities. Building upon the momentum and progress realized from the department's Capital Investment Strategy, initially submitted in 2011, the Military Department published an updated Facilities Master Plan in May 2015 that provides a systematic, multi-year approach for all departmental components to address facilities shortcomings. This plan includes a mix of new construction, targeted restoration and modernization, effective sustainment, unit re-stationing, and facility disposals. Construction focuses on building more cost effective and



flexible multi-unit/multi-use facilities, with corresponding disposals of obsolete and superfluous single-unit/ single-use facilities. Selected facilities in key locations will be modernized and expanded as needed. The overarching strategic goal is to "build down" the inventory to provide a smaller number of highly capable and more cost-effective facilities designed and maintained to fully support the needs of today's dual-purpose National Guard forces, all hazards emergency management teams, and other departmental components and functions.



The Maryland Emergency Management Agency hosted an exercise for Maryland businesses where they proceeded through a disaster scenario and discussed methods to increase coordination between the public and private sectors and augment business continuity by identifying ways that Maryland government can support businesses during disasters.

The Maryland Army National Guard's 58th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade cases its colors and is replaced by the 58th Expeditionary Military Intelligence Brigade. The casing colors and the 58th EMIB change of command ceremony took place at Camp Fretterd Military Reservation near Reisterstown, Md., on Aug. 1, 2015.

THE PRIMARY PURPOSE OF THE MARYLAND MILITARY DEPARTMENT, WHICH OVERSEES THE MARYLAND ARMY AND AIR NATIONAL GUARD, MARYLAND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY, AND THE MARYLAND DEFENSE FORCE, IS TO CONTRIBUTE TO THE SECURITY OF THE NATION AND THE STATE OF MARYLAND.

Financial support to the Maryland National Guard totaled nearly \$268 million in fiscal year 2015.

The MDNG received funds from the Department of the Army, the Department of the Air Force, the Department of Homeland Security, and the state of Maryland. State funds cover the salaries of state regular and contractual employees, maintenance, and the repair of MDNG facilities. Additionally, the state provides funds for the Honor Guard, tuition assistance for Guard members, and the ChalleNGe program.

Federal support to the Maryland Military Department is significant, as shown on the subsequent pages. These expenditures, which have an economic impact on nearly all political subdivisions in Maryland, cover pay and allowances, training, supplies, equipment, and construction. This also includes funding for the Maryland **Emergency Management Agency** by the Department of Homeland Security. The figures on pg. 8 for the counties without armories represent the salaries paid to Guardmembers who live in these political subdivisions but serve elsewhere.



The Maryland Army National Guard hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony officially opening the MG Henry C. Evans Readiness Center in Westminster, Md. on Aug. 1, 2015. The readiness center opened at its current 10-acre Hahn Road location in 1980, replacing the older World War I era armory on Longwell Avenue. The renovated and expanded 33-year-old facility includes 16,019 square feet of new space. The readiness center is home to the 29th Military Police Company, 115th Military Police Battalion, and serves as a recruiting station for Carroll County.

The Maryland Army and Air National Guard receive federal funds in three basic appropriations:

1. Military Personnel:

Includes pay, authorized allowances, uniforms and individual equipment, disability benefits, bonuses and related expenses for personnel in connection with active duty, active duty for training (two-

week annual training) and inactive duty training (drill weekends).

2. Operations and Maintenance:

Includes activities involved in the administration of the National Guard, training of units, procurement of organizational equipment, supplies, repair parts, services, equipment maintenance, and activities in connection with military support to civil authorities. This appropriation also includes all fulltime payrolls.

3. Construction:

Includes construction, sustainment, restoration and modernization, as well as procurement of facilities and related items for the National Guard. While providing readiness centers is considered to be principally a state responsibility, federal funds are provided for construction and upgrade of facilities to support the federal missions of the National Guard.



Facilities Master Plan 2015

The Military Department's 2015 Facilities Master Plan responds to changes to missions and force structure over the past three decades. Homeland Defense, homeland security, and defense support to civil authorities place increased and highly demanding responsibilities on America's National Guard. Between 1985 and 2015, the personnel strength of the Maryland Army National Guard decreased by 35 percent, while gross Readiness Center space grew by 22 percent. During the same period, National Guard units became substantially more equipment heavy and technologically sophisticated, corresponding to changes within the wider U.S. Army. The average age of Readiness Centers in 2010 exceeded 55 years, the upper limit of the Department of Defense (DOD) standard for a RC's useful lifespan. Changes in force structure and unit re-stationing created facility space excesses at a few sites with widespread functional space deficits in most locations. The Maryland Army National Guard real property inventory had become over-built, over-aged, and improperly configured to support the current composition, missions, and requirements of the force.

During this same period, the Maryland Air National Guard saw considerable turbulence in the number and type of aircraft flown at its air base in Middle River, and opened a new era in national defense with the activation of a cyber-warfare squadron. The staff of the Maryland Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) doubled in size, reflecting increased emphasis on an all hazards approach to emergency management, and the need for ongoing training and preparations to support well-coordinated, interagency response to a broad range of emergencies.



The Maryland Army National Guard hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony officially opening the Tactical Unmanned Aircraft System Operation Building on May 14, 2015, at Webster Field in St. Inigoes, Md. Construction began in 2011 and was completed in December 2014.

In addition, the Maryland Defense Force saw an increase in membership and in the types of roles they are able to perform within the state to support the federally recognized components and other state functions.

Departmental master planning is focused on reducing obsolete facility space, sustaining and effectively modernizing the inventory, and fully supporting forces and missions. To achieve this, the number of Readiness Centers will be reduced to as few as 24 by fiscal year 2036 and their average age cut in half. Ground maintenance facilities will be fully modernized to improve their safety and throughput capacity. The MEMA headquarters will be expanded and modernized to accommodate all staff and functions in a single location. MDDF functions will be housed in shared space where possible, and all facilities will be maintained and modernized in a coordinated program driven by current facility condition, configuration, and capacity analyses.

Capital Projects—Fiscal Year 2015

During fiscal year 2015, the Maryland Army National Guard completed several major military construction (MILCON) projects, and continued with construction and planning of several others. The completed Tactical Unmanned Aerial System (TUAS) Operations Building at the Webster Field Annex, Patuxent River Naval Air Station, supports TUAS operations and maintenance. The MDARNG construction on a new Readiness Center in La Plata and a significant modernization and expansion of the Readiness Center in Westminster. Construction is ongoing to expand and modernize the Readiness Center in Dundalk. Together, these new RCs will ultimately provide over 127,800 square feet of new and renovated operational space to support Army National Guard units and missions. The Maryland Air National Guard completed its new headquarters building at Warfield Air Base, and broke ground on a new network warfare facility at Fort Meade, located near the recently formed U.S. Cyber Command.

Programmed Future Projects

The Maryland Military Department has several capital projects programmed in the near term. Army National Guard projects including both construction and capital repairs—are generally supported with a mix of federal and state funding. Air National Guard construction is entirely federally funded, while funding for state elements such as the Emergency Management Agency are entirely state funded.

• Havre de Grace Readiness Center (2015-2017) at a cost of \$19.3 million, including \$14.6 million in federal funding and \$4.7 million in state funding.

• Easton Readiness Center (2016-2018) at a cost of \$18.4 million, including \$14.9 in federal funding and \$3.5 million in state funding.

• Freedom Readiness Center (2018-2020) at a cost of \$30.1 million, including \$22.0 million in federal funding and \$8.1 million in state funding.

• MEMA Headquarters Facility (2019-2021) at a cost of \$12.95 million in state funding.

• Combined Support Maintenance Shop (2020-2022) at \$20 million with \$15 million in federal funding and \$5 million in state funding.

We develop and empower them to exemplify the values that represent the Army. We seek individuals that can work cohesively together and respect individual differences in order to strengthen the collective team.

Maryland Army National Guard Accomplishments for 2015

The Maryland Army National Guard successfully accomplished the early conversion from 58th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade to 58th Expeditionary Military Intelligence Brigade.

The 58th Expeditionary Military Intelligence Brigade headquarters achieved an 85 percent fill of personnel with 80 percent qualified with their specific duty military occupation specialty qualifications within the first quarter of conversion.

The 629th Military Intelligence Battalion achieved a 71 percent fill of personnel with 60 percent DMOSQ within six months of conversion. Fill and DMOSQ rate was more than nine months ahead of schedule, with C3 rating targeted for 3rd quarter of fiscal year 2018 a year ahead of 4-year timeline approved by Department of the Army. Army units reporting C3 or

higher are considered as deployable for global operations.

The MDARNG achieved "Green" State in the overall unit status report (leading 27 other states in the nation), while executing five federal mobilizations/deployments.

The MDARNG exceeded the National Guard Bureau's goal of 4,800 with a fiscal year 2015 closeout of 4,819. This is the first time MDARNG strength has been above 4,800 in five years a net positive gain of over 123 in fiscal year 2015.

The MDARNG examined its recruiting pool and re-stationed units to match demographic opportunities state-wide.

The MDARNG accomplished three military construction projects improving unit support and quality of life in Dundalk, LaPlata, and Westminster.

The MDARNG was able to sustain 4,820 soldiers as its floor for force structure allowance as it adjusts to 4,675 (3rd quarter fiscal year 2016).

The MDARNG deployed more than 2,600 soldiers to the streets of Baltimore for a week to control the civil unrest in support of local law enforcement.

The MDARNG conducted 105 civic action projects, including static equipment displays, parades and recruiting events.

Maryland Army National Guard Future Objectives for 2016

The MDARNG will position itself for fiscal year 2016 to obtain



funding for an additional Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility in the state.

MDARNG will work to obtain state and federal funding for two new readiness centers. Havre de Grace will be a replace on site and Freedom East in Carroll County replaces Ellicott City and Catonsville.

The MDARNG will successfully execute the War Fighter Exercise involving the 29th Infantry Division detachment and the 29th Combat Aviation Brigade, as well as a National Training Center rotation for the 1297th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion.

Continual improvement of the MDARNG will allow it to compete in Army Communities of Excellence competition.

MARYLAND AIR NATIONAL GUARD

OVERVIEW: The Maryland Air National Guard is comprised of the Joint Force Headquarters, Maryland Air National Guard and the 175th Wing. The 175th Wing is made up of 24 subordinate organizations including 18 A-10C Thunderbolt II aircraft and almost 1,300 personnel, including full-time federal and state employees.

Maryland Air National Guard Accomplishments for 2015

The Maryland Air National Guard participated in Operation Baltimore Rally where they deployed approximately 500 Airmen to downtown Baltimore and into joint staff billets to support the domestic operations mission.

The MDANG participated in Sabre Strike 2015, a tactical air exercise involving members of the State Partnership Program as well the Theater Security Support Package, at Amari Air Base in Estonia.

The MDANG's 235th Civil Engineer Flight supported Maryland's State Partnership Program, the US European Command, and US Air Forces Europe with site surveys and other construction program support which were completed in Estonia, Latvia, Turkey, Germany, Moldova and Albania.

The MDANG conducted Operation Raven Care, mass casualty exercise involving members of the MDANG's 175th Medical Group and the Maryland Army National Guard's 104th Area Support Medical Company. This joint mass casualty exercise lasted two weeks.

Baltimore City School students visited the MDANG 175th Wing as a part of the BWI Summer Youth Initiative. The purpose of the program was to introduce children to careers in transportation and aviation.

The cyber and intelligence units of the 175th Wing continued to solidify their mission: Site Action Task Force was completed in August 2015. The

Maryland Air National Guard Future Objectives for 2016

The Maryland Air Guard is going to be the lead agency for Maryland's Cyber Center of Excellence. Their mission will be to generate a worldclass center that develops policy, organization, facility solutions, and leadership for Maryland's activities in the cyber domain.

The MDANG is planning and preparing for upcoming deployments involving its security forces, operations and maintenance groups, and cyber operations group. The MDANG also is planning for continued engagements with our state partnership countries Estonia and Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The 175th Medical Group of the MDANG is planning and preparing to support domestic operations/remote location support.

The MDANG is planning and preparing for further expansion of its domestic operations capabilities as well as solidify growth in cyber and intelligence missions.

The MDANG is preparing for force structure changes.

DEPLOYMENTS:

Individual members of the Maryland Air National Guard deployed to many theaters of operation throughout the year to include Afghanistan and Kuwait in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. COMMUNITY OUTREACH:

The MDANG conducted base tours for community organizations, including local high school and college ROTC programs. The MDANG assisted the Maryland Wing of the Civil Air Patrol's Tri-Wing Encampment, which is a basic training-style experience and introduction to the Civil Air Patrol for new cadets. It involves physical training, drill and ceremonies, as well as classroom instruction on U.S. Air Force fundamentals, career exploration, aerospace education, and character development. The MDANG also participated in the Military Youth ChalleNGe program and the Red Cross Blood Drive.

MARYLAND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

Mission: To ensure that Maryland families, communities, and key stakeholders are provided the tools they need to prepare for, mitigate against, respond to, and recover from the consequences of emergency and disaster events. Vision: A prepared Marylander creates a resilient Maryland

The Maryland Emergency Management Agency provided support throughout the year to local, regional, non-profit preparedness, emergency management, and homeland security programs by coordinating the disbursement of a variety of federal grants. In the past year alone, more than 100 grants were issued, while managing in excess of \$75 million in on-going projects. These investments support interoperable radio communications, personal protective equipment for first responders that now includes EMS equipment for new "warm" zone guidelines, and ensure that local jurisdictions can plan appropriately to the hazards they face.

As part of the Maryland Emergency Management Agency's mission to coordinate the state's response during disaster, the Public Assistance Program provided \$9.1 million in reimbursement to state agencies, local jurisdictions, and qualifying non-profit organizations as a result of Presidential Disaster Declarations in Maryland.

Maryland Emergency Management Agency Accomplishments for 2015

Maryland Emergency Management Agency developed and conducted its inaugural Private Sector Integration Program tabletop exercise which was attended by approximately 100 business and emergency management representatives. This exercise provided a unique and vital opportunity for forming and fostering relationships with the business community which will help create and maintain a safe and growing workplace for Marylanders.

MEMA completed its renovation of the State Emergency Operations Center from amphitheater configuration to pods. This was accomplished in time to facilitate the state's response to the Inauguration of Governor Lawrence Hogan, Jr.; several weather events; the civil disturbances in Baltimore City, which

rose in status to a Type I incident (the highest level of alert); the Papal visit; and several exercises.

Maryland Emergency Management Agency along with the Maryland Department of the Environment and other state and local partners participated in a successful federallygraded exercise on Maryland's emergency plans and procedures at the Calvert Cliffs Nuclear Power Plant in Lusby, Md. The exercise scenario involved a hostile action at the plant with the threat of a radiation release from the plant.

Maryland Emergency Management Agency planners are currently coordinating and planning for several potential and real-world special events and emergencies that include assisting the Maryland Department of Agriculture in planning a response to a potential outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, coordination with Baltimore City officials for the response to planned protests during the trials of six police officers in the aftermath of the death of Freddie Grey and the subsequent civil disturbances. We coordinated with Washington D.C. and Philadelphia officials regarding the visit of Pope Francis to the U.S. East Coast.

MEMA also hosted a workshop with local jurisdiction to improve the coordination of road salt supplies during winter months.

Maryland Emergency Management Agency Future Objectives 2016

MEMA's objective initiative is to strengthen a statewide, whole-

community Comprehensive Emergency Management Program that is interoperable across all mission areas of prevention, protection, mitigation, response, and recovery.

MEMA will focus on coordination and facilitation in the support of the incident (generally at a local level). MEMA intends to return back to basics with National Incident Management System by establishing a Field Incident Command System, Incident Management Teams, and Incident Management Assistance Teams. The State of Maryland has established four State Response Activation Levels, which provide for 24/7/365 monitoring of incidents throughout Maryland. This is accomplished through the Maryland Joint Operations Center and State Emergency Operations Center depending on activation level. The MJOC and SEOC provide the State's capability for maintaining a common operating picture, and supporting local jurisdictions and partners as needed.

MARYLAND DEFENSE FORCE

MISSION: The Maryland Defense Force is a volunteer, uniformed agency of the Maryland Military Department, authorized by Maryland law, with a mission to provide competent professional and technical support to the Maryland National Guard and state civil agencies as ordered by the Governor and the Adjutant General.

VISION: The Maryland Defense Force supports the Maryland National Guard by providing trained and ready competent personnel with professional and technical skills that augment the MDNG in its state mission and support its mobilization to, and redeployment from, federal missions. The MDDF prepares for and responds to homeland security and civil emergencies by maintaining trained and ready personnel that can supplement the state's emergency management and first-responder resources, and strengthens Maryland's communities through service programs such as the Freestate ChalleNGe. The MDDF will train to become the premier volunteer force in Maryland and to set the standard for public service for other state defense forces and volunteer public service organizations.

Maryland Defense Force Accomplishments for 2015

MDDF provided augmentation support to the MDARNG's 70th Regiment (Regional Training Institute), the MDARNG Directorate of Personnel, and the MDNG Joint Force Headquarters.

MDDF personnel continue the more than 16 years of support for the MDNG Freestate ChalleNGe Academy, this support has included medical screenings, in-processing new cadets, and band music for graduation.

JOINT STAFF ACTIVITIES AND

MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARD COUNTERDRUG PROGRAM

Since 1989, the Maryland National Guard Counterdrug Program, a federally funded Department of Defense program, has been a vital member of a coalition of law enforcement agencies, communitybased organizations, and educators. This coalition has been involved in a multi-front struggle against drugs and the violence and crime that drugs bring to our community. The mission of the program is to provide professional and dedicated military personnel with unique qualities to support federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, as well as community-based organizations in efforts to reduce the demand for drugs in our state.



Twenty-nine highly trained Army and Air National Guard personnel, who are on full-time active duty status, staff the MDNG Counterdrug Program. These skilled soldiers and airmen are in Maryland National Guard units from across the state and perform counterdrug duties in various support roles.

The MDNG provides the following agencies with counterdrug support: U.S. Immigration and Customs

Drug abuse and violence are major concerns for every community as members of the Maryland National Guard Counterdrug Task Force support the Drug Awareness Expo in Union Bridge, Md., on Oct. 8, 2015.

Enforcement, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, the Washington/ Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area, Maryland State Police, Maryland Coordination and Analysis Center, Baltimore City Police, the United States Secret Service and a variety of communitybased organizations and coalitions.

In fiscal year 2015, the Counterdrug aviation team flew 389 flight hours and conducted 12 ongoing missions with various law enforcement agencies. The Drug Demand Reduction team performed 71 ongoing missions, serving a population of 33,944 people with our drug education and awareness message. Criminal analysts supported cases which contributed to the seizure of \$1.3 million in cash, 9 vehicles, 116 weapons, and 41 pounds of other illicit narcotics. These investigations led to more than 111 arrests and 61 unique arrest incidents. The Counterdrug Program aided state and local law enforcement in the seizure of 104 pounds of cocaine, 5 pounds of methamphetamine, 54 pounds of heroin, 74 pounds of processed marijuana, and the eradication of more than 1,912 plants.





32ND CIVIL SUPPORT TEAM (CST)

IOINT STAFF ACTIVITIES



Service members from the Maryland National Guard'd 32nd Civil Support Team collaborated with members of the Bosnia and Herzegovina CBRN Defense Company during their June 5-19, 2015, training.

The 32nd Civil Support Team (Weapons of Mass Destruction) is a highly specialized unit, which supports civil authorities by responding to situations involving the use of weapons of mass destruction or other incidents. The CST's mission is to assess the incident consequences, identify chemical, biological or radiological sources or agents, advise civilian responders on appropriate actions through onsite testing and expert consultation and facilitate the arrival of additional state and federal military forces and responders. The unit is composed of 22 full-time members of the Maryland National Guard, and their skills encompass 14 specialized career fields.

The unit consists of six sections: command, operations, administration, logistics, medical, analytical and survey. Each section uses state-ofthe-art equipment to provide support to the first responder community.

Requested through the Maryland Emergency Management Agency, the CST can be immediately dispatched 24 hours a day, seven days a week, arriving at an emergency site within two hours. The unit is located at Fort Meade, Md.

In June 2015, the 32nd CST combined with Virginia's 33rd

CST, conducted a multi-CST all-hazards maritime response exercise in and around Hampton Roads. Va. The waterways of the Chesapeake Bay present unique challenges to the detection of agents on and around ships. The exercise was designed to improve techniques used in responses to chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and high-yield explosive agents in the maritime environment.

In order to prepare local government agencies and industry partners to respond in case of a CBRN attack, the CST has assisted in the development and execution of multiple tabletop exercises. These exercises involved partners such as Johns Hopkins Medical Center, Baltimore City Fire and Police Departments, the Maryland Department of the Environment, and the Department of Homeland Security.

The unit spent more than 20 days on stand-by missions to support civil authorities with counter-WMD expertise, wide area CBRN detection for National Special Security Events, and other high-profile events within Maryland. The unit joined nine other CSTs for eight days in Washington D.C. and Philadelphia for the papal visit from Pope Francis and for the World Meeting of Families.

In support of the U.S. Marshals Service and the Transportation Security Administration, the unit conducted 10 Visual Intermodal Prevention and Response missions in order to bolster the safety of the MARC Train and the Baltimore Light Rail system. The team also conducted more than 60 assist missions, providing contingency operations liaison, technical training assistance, communications compatibility, and capability briefs to state and local organizations throughout Maryland.

JOINT STAFF ACTIVITIES STATE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM (SPP)





Maj. Gen. Linda Singh, the adjutant general of Maryland, Arno Pugonen, chief, EOD Center, and Command Sgt. Maj. Thomas Beyard, senior enlisted leader. The U.S. Army European Command's Humanitarian Mining Action Program brought the Estonian Rescue Board and Maryland National Guard Soldiers together to create public service announcements. The purpose of this project is to raise awareness of and educate the public about the unexploded ordnance issue in Estonia.

The Maryland National Guard's State Partnership Program (SPP) maintains partnerships with two countries in Europe—Estonia and Bosnia and Herzegovina. The SPP was launched in Europe as part of the initial outreach by the United States toward new democracies in Central and Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. The SPP brings together U.S. states and territories with partner nations through a range of military and civil-military activities under the Maryland Military Department auspices.

The partnership program emphasizes civil and military cooperation with civil control of a professional military. Maryland has a key role in this international initiative to foster democracy, encourage market economies and promote regional cooperation and stability. Maryland's partnership with Estonia officially started in 1993 and is currently used as the primary example for developing future partnerships within the program. The partnership with Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) started in 2003 continues to flourish and expand.

In 2015, the MDNG conducted more than 50 SPP events in Maryland, Estonia, and BiH.

Estonia

U.S. and Maryland National Guard involvement in Estonia increased in 2015 due to Russian aggression. We displayed renewed commitment and strengthened our partnership with Estonia while supporting the increased U.S. presence in the Baltic States.

Maryland Air National Guard sent over 100 personnel, to include pilots, airfield operations, and fueling experts and eight A-10 aircraft to support the Estonian Air Force as well as air components of the other Baltic nations during the 2015 Sabre Strike Exercise, a major NATO and Baltic exercise. They provided mentoring in close air support, airfield operations and procedures, and fuel mixing.

Maj. Gen. Singh visited her counterparts in the Estonian Defense Forces and Estonian Defense League as well as other regional leaders in 2015 to demonstrate the MDNG's commitment to our current and future partnership. A four-person team from the MDARNG competed in the Admiral Pitka Reconnaissance Challenge in Estonia and finished 12th of 24 teams from Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Latvia, Norway, Sweden, and the United States. The challenging military competition included multiple objectives along a winding 140-kilometer route through the Estonian countryside.

SPP events with Estonia in 2015 continued to capitalize on success and expand our partnership in cyber defense activities in Estonia and Maryland, aviation opportunities, and reconnaissance exercises while contributing to the Humanitarian Mine Assistance Program with medical and public affairs support.

Bosnia and Herzegovina

The MDNG hosted more than 70 members of the Armed Forces of Bosnia and Herzegovina (AFBiH) in 2015. These soldiers conducted very diverse training with MDNG soldiers in both field and garrison environments. These military to military events provided learning opportunities for our Partner Nation's soldiers and our service members. The MDNG also sent more than 30 soldiers to BiH in 2015, providing interoperability and familiarization to nearly 300 leaders and members of the AFBiH.

Maj. Gen. Singh and key leaders of the Maryland National Guard met with the Senior Civil and Military Leadership of BiH in 2015 to outline the benefit, importance and future of the SPP between Maryland and BiH.

The 2015 SPP events with BiH continued and expanded upon our successful joint ventures in infantry, reconnaissance, engineer, and military police. We are also concentrating on the requirements of the civil and Armed Forces of BiH with a strong focus on aviation maintenance and operations, Defense Support of Civil Authority operations, and joint and special staff development.





FREESTATE CHALLENGE ACADEMY

THE MISSION OF THE ACADEMY IS TO INTERVENE IN AND RECLAIM THE LIVES OF AT-RISK YOUTH AND TO PRODUCE GRADUATES WITH THE VALUES, SKILLS, EDUCATION AND SELF-DISCIPLINE NEEDED TO SUCCEED AS ADULTS. STUDENTS ARE BROUGHT INTO A STRUCTURED AND HIGHLY DISCIPLINED QUASI-MILITARY ACADEMIC SETTING THAT BUILDS CONFIDENCE AND SELF-ESTEEM TO BECOME PRODUCTIVE AND CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS OF OUR SOCIETY.

The program begins with a 22-week residency phase at the Freestate ChalleNGe Academy at the Edgewood Area of Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md. Following graduation from the resident phase, the cadets are mentored for an additional 12 months. During that time, they are placed into jobs, continue their education or enter the military.

In 2015, the Freestate ChalleNGe Academy reached a significant milestone since it's inception in 1993. With the June graduation of Class #44, the FCA graduated its 4000th cadet. This milestone has shown not only the longevity of the program but also the overall success in changing the lives of at-risk youth throughout the state of Maryland. As the program continues to grow, several other accomplishments have been realized.

The FCA was able to procure a \$50,000 grant from the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation. This grant helped to establish a computer lab and purchased teaching and study materials for the cadets to prepare for and pass the new GED test. The GED test was upgraded from a 9th-grade level comprehension test to a college-entrance level test in 2014. This change made it difficult for cadets in ChalleNGe programs throughout the U.S. to pass the test and receive their high school equivalent diploma. Receiving this grant allowed FCA to purchase the necessary materials to teach and train the cadets in preparation for their GED test. The results have shown an increase in the number of cadets who are now passing the GED test, thus receiving their Maryland High School diploma. Another key accomplishment is that the FCA's

computer lab is now certified by national education contractor Pearson Vue to conduct the GED test. This enables us to teach our cadets longer on the test subject material and allow us to test our cadets more often and on our schedule rather than transporting cadets to off-site venues to take the test. We expect greater positive results for all our cadets who take the GED test.

We understand that not all youth are meant to or want to attend college. FCA has established a vocational training program for our

cadets to allow them to learn a trade they can gain certification in and take with them as they transition from our program into their adult lives. Training in culinary arts, barbering, and automotive training has been very successful in just the first two FCA classes it has been offered. As we go forward, we are reviewing the addition of other trade programs that can assist in developing cadets' life skills. We have been fortunate to also receive a \$40,000 grant from the Dresher Foundation to assist in budgeting for these excellent training programs.





MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARD SUPPORT PROGRAMS

PARTNERS IN CARE AND STRONG BONDS



The Maryland National Guard's Partners in Care initiative donated 50 holiday meals to soldiers and Airmen for Thanksgiving. The meals were delivered to the Fifth Regiment Armory in Baltimore, Md., Nov. 24, 2014.

Partners in Care:

The Partners in Care program is an initiative of the Maryland National Guard, providing relationships with local congregations for referral and support of Maryland National Guard members and their families when in need. A memorandum of understanding between participating congregations and the Maryland National Guard allows for the referral of soldiers, airmen, and family members to the closest Partners in Care congregation for support. Each congregation provides support within the limits of its ability free of charge, regardless of religious affiliation, and without further obligation.

Services include, but are not limited to: counseling for individuals, couples, and families. Services also include childcare, children and youth support groups, basic household and auto repair, family and loved ones' deployment and reintegration support, crisis and grief counseling, and many other helpful services.

There are currently 96 participating congregations representing 19 different faith groups in 23 counties



and Baltimore City. Partners in Care is administered by the Joint Force Headquarters Chaplain's Office. In 2015, we responded to 89 requests for support and assistance.

Strong Bonds:

Strong Bonds is a chaplain-led Army program in support of Guard member and family relationships. Strong Bonds offers programs for single soldiers, married soldiers, and families that teach relationship skills designed to promote healthy and resilient relationships. The retreats are free and are led by certified instructors at locations across Maryland. This past year, we held 9 events and helped more than 302 soldiers and their families.





Chaplain (Maj) Lonny S. M. Wortham, 1100th Theater Aviation Sustainment Maintenance Group, hosted a Strong Bonds event, in order to conduct Relationship Enhancement soldier Training (REST), in the Schaffer Dining Hall, located at the 5th Regiment Armory, Baltimore, Md., on Sept. 15, 2015.





The goal of the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program is to provide National Guard and Reserve members and their families with sufficient information, services, referral and proactive outreach opportunities throughout the entire deployment cycle, pre-deployment, deployment, demobilization, and reintegration. During 2015, the YRRP hosted 14 events attended by more 374 Guard members and more than 36 family members. Hotel accommodations are available for soldiers, airmen, and family members traveling 150 miles or more one way to the event location from their home of record.

Phase I: Pre-deployment phase events are all-day activities for soldiers and airmen and their families. Most of the training is for the family members who will remain at home. Included are classes on resilience, legal issues, finance and budgeting, using Tricare

health benefits, suicide prevention, and depression identification.

Phase 2: During the deployment phase, family members are invited to an event 60 to 90 days before the unit returns. They are offered classes in reuniting with the soldier or airman, recommended strategies for the family, children's issues, and resilience training.

Phase 3: The demobilization phase for soldiers and airmen at the demobilization site. Typically, this is held at the mobilization base from which the unit departed. It gives information and contacts they may need in the first 30 to 45 days at home.

Phase 4: The reintegration phase consists of three parts.

The first event occurs approximately 30-40 days after the unit returns home. It is for soldiers and airmen and their families. This event is held at a local hotel, and attendees are taught reconnecting with their family and children, single soldier issues and female service member issues. Other classes include Department of Veterans Affairs benefits, employment, resilience, finance, interacting with law enforcement, and post traumatic stress

disorder prevention.

Approximately 60 to 70 days after the unit returns, a second reintegration event is held at a hotel. It is for soldiers and airmen and their families. Classes include anger management, substance abuse, suicide prevention, spiritual resilience, and applied resilience.

Finally, approximately 90 to 180 days after a unit returns, service members have a Post Deployment Health Reassessment at the Baltimore VA Regional Office. Soldiers view two mandatory films and then meet with a health care provider. During this event, units address any outstanding line of duty injury problems.



FAMILY PROGRAMS

Family Readiness:

The mission of the Family Readiness Program is to establish ongoing communication, involvement, support, and recognition between the members of the Maryland National Guard and members of their families in a partnership that promotes the best of both. It seeks to contribute to and enhance the quality of life for Maryland National Guard members, their families and the communities in which they live.

The Family Assistance Program triad is comprised of six Family Assistance Center Specialists, four Family Readiness Support Assistants, and 33 Family Readiness Groups that are supported by more than 54 volunteers. The Family Assistance Centers provided five essential services: crisis intervention; legal/ financial resource information and referral; Tricare information; identification cards and Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System information; as well as community resource information and referrals. The Family Readiness Support Assistants provided direct support to brigade commanders for all aspects of the Deployment Support Cycle and enhanced the

overall family readiness posture of units. The program provided more than 142,500 quick tracker contacts, 29 unit based briefings to 5400 individuals, conducted 92 site visits, completed 380 outreach contacts, and provided more than 77,000 mass communication events (email, social media, and newsletters).

The Family Readiness Program worked closely with DCS (Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program), and the FAC staff. The FRP supported 14 events, providing services to 410 soldiers and their family members. The Family Readiness Program provided the logistical planning and execution for the state chaplain's Strong Bonds retreats, executing five weekend retreats and four unit-based Strong Bonds events that reached 108 soldiers and 79 family members.

The Family Readiness Groups, guided by the unit commanders and FRSAs, reported a total of 1,332 volunteer hours, a 156% increase

from the previous year. The FRSAs provided support to FRGs 198 times and attended 19 FRG meetings. The FRSAs also provided support to 49 family events, 24 youth events, and two quarterly Recruitment and Sustainment events reaching 410 soldiers and family members. The FRSA team provided 62 command staff with basic FRG training and also conducted 42 foundational volunteer trainings throughout the year.

The Family Readiness Program was augmented by various Department of Defense supported programs that provides information and referrals to community services and support, non-medical counseling, and financial education to service members and families geographically separated from military installations. These programs include Military One Source, Survivor Outreach Services, and the Transitional Assistance Advisor.

Child & Youth Program:

The mission of the Child & Youth Program is to offer training and support for school-aged attendees at pre-deployment, deployment, and post deployment events. It also coordinates and conducts evidencebased developmentally appropriate life skills and resilience-building education and youth development events for school-aged dependents of MDNG members. The program also provides information, assistance, referral, and follow-up services regarding available resources that support MDNG children and youth.

During 2015, the Child & Youth Program provided and participated in 34 events that reached 582

MDNG children. It also provided 148 resource and referral contacts. The Maryland National Guard Child & Youth Program continued to focus on sustaining the 64 volunteers who provided 353 hours of volunteer work. Some activity highlights were the annual Drop & Shop event, the Christmas Tree Giveaway, the Summer and Spring Day Camps, and two Healthy Family weekends.

When the Maryland National Guard Teen Council began in 2006, there were five members. In 2015, the Teen Council had a strong core group of 26 members. During

2015, the Teen Council participated in a Youth Symposium and three leadership trainings. This past year, the Maryland National Guard hosted its tenth-annual HOMEFRONT Challenge Camp for children and youth who have a parent in the Maryland National Guard. The camp was comprised of 56 campers, ages 7-12, who participated in a five-day residential camp. The Teen Council members served as counselors throughout the week. The Youth Program also provided a five day residential Teen Challenge Camp for the 26 members of the Teen Council that took place in Worton, Md.



Starting off the holiday weekend, The Maryland National Guard's Recruiting & Retention Battalion, held their annual organization day at Camp Frettered Military Reservation in Reisterstown, Md., July 1, 2015. The event was held to bring soldiers and their families together, engage in activities, and to boost morale.



EDUCATION INITIATIVE

The Maryland National Guard plays a major role in the state's higher education program. Realizing the important need for education, the Guard strives to improve the educational status of its service members.

Through various programs such as the State Tuition Waiver, State Tuition Reimbursement, and Federal Tuition Assistance programs, partnerships between the MDNG and higher education institutions give our military personnel avenues to pursue a valuable education. In addition, these partnerships provide Guard members the opportunity to obtain a college education at little or no cost.

The state of Maryland, in fiscal year 2015, budgeted approximately \$50,000 of State Tuition Assistance for MDNG service members. Additionally, more than 400 Maryland Army National Guard soldiers took advantage of Federal Tuition Assistance. MDNG members also received substantial tuition discounts through the State Tuition Waiver program. The MDNG education programs allow service members to take advantage of state and partner colleges and universities, including vocational-tech and apprenticeship programs. These educational programs are some of the most significant initiatives for the MDNG. Educational entitlements also help to support personnel strength and retention.

CENTER FOR MILITARY HISTORY

THE MARYLAND MILITARY DEPARTMENT CENTER FOR MILITARY HISTORY IS LOCATED AT THE FIFTH REGIMENT ARMORY IN BALTIMORE. 
MARYLAND MUSEUM OF MILITARY HISTORY AND ARCHIVES

The Maryland Museum of Military History was founded in 1982 as the Museum of the Maryland National Guard. The museum was the culmination of years of effort by a group of dedicated officers and, until 2005, was operated and maintained by the Maryland Military Historical Society, a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit that continues to serve as the museum's advisory body and source of vital financial aid.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the 2015 fiscal year, the museum has accomplished several significant goals:

In 2015, the Maryland Military Historical Society continued its wide range of educational programs to complement its exhibitions. This

Continued to develop the student internship program through a partnership with the Department of Public History at Stevenson University. The museum provided Stevenson University with several requests for historical information and the students provided the research.

Continued to answer public requests for 29th Infantry Division World War II records to be made available and updated.

Continued to provide personal assistance to educators, authors and members of the public researching many aspects of Maryland Military History. This assistance has been provided in person, by phone, and by e-mail.

The Historical Society coordinated a complete inventory of all artifacts to include federal property, state property and items that are on loan to the Military Department.

THE MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARD HONOR GUARD PROVIDES MILITARY FUNERAL HONORS FOR VETERANS THROUGHOUT THE STATE OF MARYLAND. THESE HONORS ARE ONE OF THE BENEFITS OFFERED TO THOSE WHO SERVED OUR NATION IN TIMES OF WAR AND PEACE.

The Maryland National Guard Honor Guard provides military funeral honors for veterans throughout the state of Maryland. During fiscal year 2015, the Honor Guard performed 3,555 military honors at state veterans cemeteries and numerous private cemeteries. Military funeral honors are one of the benefits offered to those who served our nation in times of war and peace.

The benefit is free and available, by law, to military personnel on active duty; former members, who served on active duty and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable; members of the selected Reserve; former members of the selected Reserve, who served at least one term of enlistment or period of initial obligated service and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable; and former members of the selected Reserve, who were discharged due to a service-connected disability.

Since its inception in 1998, the Maryland National Guard Honor Guard has conducted more than 50,000 honors for our Maryland veterans. During Fiscal Year 2015, the MDNGHG Colors Team represented the Maryland Military Department in many events including the Fallen Heroes ceremony in the state senate, the Fallen Warrior ceremony at Camp Fretterd Military Reservation, the annual running of the Preakness Stakes, and services for veterans at Maryland state cemeteries on Memorial Day and Veterans Day.

The Honor Guard performed military funeral honors for former Governor Marvin Mandel and Maryland Delegate James Proctor who passed away this year.

The Honor Guard is made up of 75 soldiers and airmen and is located in four areas around the state with its headquarters at the 5th Regiment Armory. Director Jari Villanueva and Deputy Director Dominic Boyd are responsible for approximately 300 funeral missions a month, ensuring each are performed with the utmost respect and dignity as protocol demands.


