

PURPOSE

The Maryland Military Department's state mission is to provide trained personnel to protect life, property, preserve peace, maintain order and ensure public safety as directed by the Governor. The Military Department maintains facilities throughout the state which enable itts pillars to prepare, train, and accomplish assigned missions.

OVERVIEW

The Maryland Military Department is a state governmental organization comprised of four pillars: the Maryland Army National Guard, Maryland Air National Guard, Maryland Emergency Management Agency, and Maryland Defense Force. It was established in 1957 with the Adjutant General in a civilian capacity to manage and maintain the Guard and its missions. Within the MMD, a residential Freestate ChalleNGe program is supported that graduates approximately 200 at-risk youth per year. The MDNG Honor Guard performs military funeral honors for approximately 215 veterans per month. The 175th Wing maintains an operational fire department in addition to the A-10C Thunderbolt II flying mission along with the 175th Cyber Operations mission. We are required to submit timely and accurate request to receive federal reimbursement for state funds expended through cooperative agreements to fund military programs budgeted for more than \$60 million annually. The MMD executes the facilities master plan over a capital portfolio valued in excess of \$750 million by balancing new construction projects with sustainment maintenance while accounting for state property at facilities geographically separated throughout Maryland.

ECONOMIC IMPACT

The MDNG receives federal funds in three basic appropriations:

MILITARY PERSONNEL

Includes pay, authorized allowances, uniforms and individual equipment, disability benefits, bonuses, and related expenses for personnel in connection with active duty, active duty for training (two week annual training), and inactive duty training (drill weekends).


OPERATIONS AND MAINTENANCE

Includes activities involved in the administration of the National Guard, training of units, procurement of organizational equipment, supplies, repair parts, services, equipment maintenance, and activities in connection with military support to civil authorities. This appropriation also includes full-time staff payrolls.

CONSTRUCTION


Includes National Guard facility construction, sustainment, restoration, modernization, facilities procurement, and related items. While providing readiness centers is principally a state responsibility, federal funds are appropriated for construction and upgrade of facilities to support the federal missions of the National Guard.

WHERE THE FUNDING GOES



The Maryland National Guard receives funds from the Department of the Army, Department of the Air Force, Department of Homeland Security, and the state of Maryland. State funds cover the salaries of state regular and contract employees, and supports maintenance and repair of department facilities. Additionally, the state provides funds for the Veterans' Honor Guard, tuition assistance for Guard members, and the Freestate Challenge program. Federal support to the Military Department is significant. These expenditures, which have a statewide economic impact, cover pay and allowances, training, supplies, equipment, and construction. It includes some operational funding for MEMA by the Department of Homeland Security.

COMPLETED CAPITAL PROJECTS

FREEDOM READINESS CENTER

The new readiness center in Sykesville is anticipated to be operational by 2022. The center costs \$25 million, \$17 million in federal and \$8 million in state funding. The center was officially renamed the Major General Linda L. Singh Readiness Center in October 2021.

MDANG CYBER OPERATIONS CENTER

The operations center is a geographically separated MDANG facility on Fort Meade near the U.S. Cyber Command. The facility cost \$6 million in federal funding and the 10,000 square foot building opened in FY21.



PROGRAMMED FUTURE FACILITIES PROJECTS

AIRCRAFT MAINTENANCE HANGAR

The facility is slated for renovation in FY22 and will receive an estimated \$0 in state funding and \$2 million in federal funding. The hangar is located at the Warfield Air National Guard Base.

COMBINED SUPPORT MAINTENANCE SHOP

Currently in the project design phase, its estimated cost is \$22 million, \$12 million in federal and \$10 million in state funding. The Maryland Military Department has requested additional federal funding. The projected completion for the Havre de Grace facility is January 2024.

We serve as the Joint Force Headquarters for Maryland and assist the Adjutant General in exercising authority and direction over assigned and attached organizations of the Maryland Military Department in order to accomplish state and federal missions.









The Maryland Joint Staff oversaw the Maryland National Guard's response to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2021. In February, Joint Staff members were federally mobilized in order to directly support the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) with vaccination site setups and administrative functions. The Joint Staff worked closely with partners at all levels of state and local governments, including county executives and Governor Larry Hogan. By September 2021, the Joint Staff supported coordination of 175,000 vaccinations over 13 counties and facilitated 83,000 tests.

For the first and second quarter of 2021, the Joint Staff focused primarily on direct coordination of mass vaccination site setups and county vaccination site support. By June 30, 2021, the Joint Staff had assisted in the planning and coordination of 742 missions and five mass vaccination sites throughout the state of Maryland, including M&T Bank Stadium, Six Flags, Wicomico Civic Center, Greenbelt Metro Station, and Hagerstown Premium Outlets. The Joint Staff worked with planning cells in the Army and Air National Guard in order to ensure the success of all vaccination and testing missions around the state. The Joint Staff played a vital role in the initial rollout of Moderna and Pfizer vaccines, working closely with MDNG medical personnel to initiate vaccinations for Maryland guardsmen and citizens alike.

The Joint Staff was able to provide MDNG leadership with timely and relevant information that allowed them to employ administrative and vaccination resources effectively throughout the state. Over 193 days of COVID-19 pandemic support was provided to address the unique challenges of vaccination site administration and setup. This effort helped vaccinate over 175,000 Marylanders over the course of eight months, reducing the spread of the virus and saving lives. The Joint Staff continues to provide support to MDH and other state partners as we continue to remain vigilant in combatting the spread of the COVID-19.

We are an organization of excellence, embedded in our communities and focused on improving security, safety, and support to all citizens. We man, equip, train, and sustain the force to mobilize when ordered to federal service by the president, and provide support to civil authorities during state emergencies as directed by The Adjutant General.



The Maryland Army National Guard supported Operation Capitol Response with about 800 soldiers and Brig. Gen. Janeen Birckhead as the commander for Task Force Capitol Grounds. MDNG continued in Washington D.C. to support the peaceful transition of power during the 59th President Inauguration.

MDARNG medical support teams assisted and supported mass vaccination sites. Concurrently, MDNG continued to support the ongoing COVID response. Governor Larry Hogan appointed Brig. Gen. Birckhead as the Vaccine Equity Task Force lead to ensure communities facing barriers the equitable opportunity to receive vaccines.

At the same time, Guard members prepared for federal missions and headed out on deployments. The 729th Quartermaster Composite Supply Company was welcomed home from their NATO mission in Poland to support Operation Atlantic Resolve. The 58th Expeditionary Military Intelligence Brigade and 629th Expeditionary Military Intelligence Battalion returned from supporting Operation Inherent Resolve in Afghanistan, also returning was B. Company 20th Special Forces. The 29th Military Police Company deployed troops to Camp Bondsteel in Kosovo with back-to-back missions. Also, an MDARNG Medevac and ASB sent an aviation maintenance section to Kosovo. Members of the 58th Troop Command's 110th Information Operations Battalion rotated teams deployed to Djibouti to continue support in the Horn of Africa. The 29th Infantry Division deployed to Kuwait and assisted with the Afghans' resettlement.

Guard members Capt. Ryan Slaughter, a logistics officer with the 70th Regiment, was deemed the best officer for the 2021 MDNG Best Warrior Competition. Spc. Richard Granke, a healthcare specialist with the 224th Medical Company Area Support, and Sgt. James McGill, a 224th Medical Company Area Support radiology specialist, were deemed the best soldier and noncommissioned officer of the 2021 MDNG Best Warrior Competition. McGill went on to win Region 2 at Fort Indiantown Gap, Pa., and proudly represented Maryland at the National Best Warrior Competition at Camp Navajo, Ariz.

We are committed to community while ensuring our aircraft and personnel are ready to support state and federal missions. We are the lead agency for Maryland's Cyber Center of Excellence, developing policy, organization, facility solutions, and leadership for Maryland's operations in the cyber domain.



As the pandemic continued the past year, the Maryland Air National Guard stayed very busy. Airmen of the 175th Wing forward deployed to six vaccination sites across Maryland, administered 77,000 vaccines to the community. These mobile vaccination support team also provided support for the distribution of hundreds of thousands more vaccinations during those missions. The 175th Medical Group held 29 vaccination events for guard members, retirees, and their dependents leading all ANG states in COVID-19 vaccinations.

A team of five senior planners augmented the Maryland Department of Health incident command staff and helped state officials open 12 mass vaccination locations across the state. In conjunction with the University of Maryland Medical System, 85 Airmen from 17 different squadrons of the 175th Wing operated the state's second-largest mass vaccination site at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, ultimately distributing over 248,000 vaccines. The 55,000 square foot stadium site in Baltimore was setup in just 18 days by those Airmen. Vice President Kamala Harris, Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force JoAnne S. Bass, and Governor Larry Hogan visited the site and thanked the Airmen for their support to the community.

Airmen of the 175th Logistics Readiness Squadron "Port Dawgs" processed thousands of National Guard members and handled over 260,000 pounds of equipment and cargo in support of the 59th Presidential Inauguration in Washington, D.C. Members of the 175th Security Forces Squadron also provided support to the Presidential election and civil unrest.

With the sudden influx of evacuees from Afghanistan, the wing mobilized approximately 30 Airmen to support reception and processing efforts at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, N.J.

A-10 Ops and Maintenance deployed for four exercises since October 2020, like Combat Hammer, Volk Field CSAREX, and Green Flag West. During Hawgsmoke, 175th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron won top honors and the 104th Fighter Squadron had the top A-10 pilot in the U.S Air Force. The 175th Cyber Operations Group mobilized in both our offensive and defensive cyber missions for United States Cyber Command's Cyber National Mission Force and conducted exercises like Southern Strike 21, Cyber Blitz, and the President's Cup, in addition to conducting state cyber response activities. The 135th Intelligence Squadron simultaneously supported combatant commanders across the globe and Counterdrug Program priorities in the state.

The Maryland Air National Guard commemorated 100 years of serving the state and nation with a centennial celebration on June 29, 2021. The Wing closed out the year with Air Combat Command capstone inspection with an effective rating, five superior teams and 30 superior performers.

We proactively reduce disaster risks and reliably manage consequences through collaborative work with Maryland's communities and partners.



The state COVID-19 operations shifted from response to recovery mode as Maryland prepared to address the long-term effects of the pandemic. The Maryland Emergency Management Agency supported the coordination and establishment of vaccination clinics and mobile vaccination units, booster shots, testing efforts, contact tracing, and ongoing outreach to underserved communities. MEMA continues to fill key roles in the Multi-Agency Coordination Unified Command organizational chart, with the Maryland Department of Health as the lead agency.

The International Association of Emergency Managers awarded the Department of Emergency Management a global technology award for the agency's innovative approach to resource management during the COVID-19 Pandemic. When availability and distribution of personal protective equipment (PPE) became an important consideration, Maryland officials quickly developed a formula to calculate how fast the material was being used.

MEMA worked with local and federal partners to respond to weather events in 2021 and continued recovery efforts from storms that hit in 2020. The remnants of hurricane Ida tore through Maryland on September 1, spawning several tornadoes and causing flood damage. The Small Business Administration approved a disaster declaration that made low-interest loans available to survivors in Anne Arundel, Cecil and Montgomery counties. Additionally, MEMA staffed the State Emergency Operations Center as a late October nor'easter brought some of the worst tidal flooding to the state. Concurrently, MEMA continued to coordinate reimbursements from the Federal Emergency Management Agency for hurricanes and costs related to the COVID-19 response. As of late October, FEMA provided reimbursement of more than \$1.6 million for damages related to hurricane Isaias and almost \$1.03 billion for COVID-19 costs to state and local government agencies.

The State of Maryland 2021 Hazard Mitigation Plan that was adopted by Governor Larry Hogan was the result of collaboration between local jurisdictions and stakeholders to identify, assess and develop mitigation strategies to address hazards impacting Marylanders. The plan builds upon the 2016 version to add additional hazards, including public health emergencies, soil movement, extreme temperatures, dam failure, as well as human-caused hazards and threats.

The Hazard Mitigation Branch learned in April that FEMA approved \$3 million in funding to help the city of Annapolis with a major project to reduce flooding around its harbor and preserve the state capitol's historic waterfront. Eleven projects were submitted for funding under FEMA's Building Resilience Infrastructure and Communities program and are undergoing final review, to include a plan to improve the water quality and shoreline of the Middle Branch of the Patapsco River in Baltimore.

As of 01 October 2021, MEMA no longer exists, in its place is the Maryland Department of Emergency Management (MDEM), an agency that is completely independent of the Maryland Military Department (MMD)

We are a volunteer, uniformed component of the Maryland Military Department, authorized by Maryland law. The MDDF provides trained and competent personnel with professional and technical skills that augment the MDNG in its state mission and support its mobilization to and redeployment from, federal missions.



Fiscal Year 2021 was remarkably busy for the Maryland Defense Force (MDDF). Three MDDF units were re-designated including the 27th Training Battalion, the 231st Troop Command and the 256th Cyber Defense Unit. The MDDF was awarded the prestigious 2020 Governor's Service Award in the Government Agency category and the 10th Medical Regiment was awarded the 2021 U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Innovation Award.

The MDDF 10th MR was especially busy supporting Maryland's efforts against the spread of the COVID-19 virus. For months, the unit spearheaded MDDF's support of the Maryland National Guard (MDNG) veterans COVID-19 vaccination clinic at the Baltimore Veteran's Administration Medical Center. A separate MDNG vaccination program for Baltimore City residents was also supported by MDDF personnel at New Shiloh Baptist Church.

A total of 70 Maryland Army National Guard buildings were inspected by MDDF's 121st Engineer Regiment as a part of the annual MDNG Installation Status Report program. MDDF personnel donated 1,050 hours to complete this mission. The 121st ER also taught an Infrastructure and Society course at the University of Maryland at College Park during the fall semester.

The 231st Troop Command managed the in-processing for the MDNG Freestate ChalleNGe Academy at Aberdeen Proving Ground – Edgewood Area. This year COVID-19 testing was administered and vaccination shots were provided to those in need. Additionally, MDDF provided interpretation services for families of Spanish speaking cadets.

The 256th Cyber Defense Unit conducted joint virtual drills with the Virginia Defense Force where incident response, recovery best practices and physical penetration testing were reviewed. The unit also shared best practices and lessons learned during the annual 2021 State Guard Association of the United States conference.

During all three phases of the Maryland Army National Guard Officer Candidate School, the MDDF Chaplain Corps performed religious services, prayers, counseling, pastoral care and provided moral support for the officer candidates. The goal of the Chaplain Corps was to help the candidates with their spiritual, emotional and psychological needs in order to be at their best while facing adversity.

The MDDF Band performed during a Memorial Day Ceremony at Crownsville Veterans Cemetery (Salute to Veterans) and a Memorial Day Ceremony that honored veterans in Pasadena, Md. where a bugler was provided to Sound TAPS on 29, 30, and 31 May. The MDDF Band performed with the 229th Army Band for Concert in the Park at Tydings Memorial Park in Havre de Grace and supported the Maryland National Guard Officer Candidate School graduation at Aberdeen Proving Ground – Edgewood Area. The MDDF Band also played with the 229th Army Band for a concert at Shamrock Park in Belair and at a ceremony honoring the Military and First Responders at the Timonium Fairgrounds.






The Maryland National Guard State Partnership Program hosted defense attachés from their state partners, Estonia and Bosnia-Herzegovina as well as Adriatic Charter members from Croatia, Montenegro and North Macedonia at the Baltimore Convention Center field hospital and the M&T Bank Stadium mass vaccination site in Baltimore, Maryland. The visit was intended to share lessons learned from Maryland's response with rapidly deploying personnel and equipment to combat the coronavirus pandemic. The first live event of the fiscal year focused on the attachés that lived in the local Washington, D.C., Maryland and Virginia areas.

Soldiers and Airmen from the 244th Engineer Company, MDARNG and 175th Civil Engineer Squadron, MDANG, participated in an engineering assessment with their Estonian Defense League counterparts in September. The assessments aimed to re-invigorate construction projects that started in 2019 but were put on hold due to COVID-19. Proposed projects for the future include barracks renovations, classrooms, shelters and expansions to live-fire ranges.

In September, Maryland's 1297th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion partnered with the District of Columbia to share maintenance subject matter expertise with Service Members from Burkina Faso. The National Guard unit in Washington, D.C. recently started an SPP partnership with Burkina Faso in 2018. This event was an example of how neighboring national guard units can support for a specific skillset that is unavailable in their State. MDNG's SPP is partnering with DCNG in fiscal year 22 for a Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives training event in Bosnia and Herzegovina.








EXECUTED 16 TOTAL EVENTS WITH BIH




