

MDNG AIRMAN NAMED OUTSTANDING HUMAN RESOURCE ADVISOR

enior Master Sgt. Sterling Johnson, 175th Wing Human Resource Advisor, Maryland Air National Guard, was awarded the 2014 Air National Guard Outstanding Human Resource Advisor of the Year on January 29, 2015.

The National Guard Bureau looked for and found an advisor who promoted diversity, inclusion, cultural change and force management.

The Guard Bureau has requested that Johnson use the wing's program to enhance the other units in the Mid-Atlantic region.

"Now that we have the number one program, we will show these others wings what we do. My vision is to streamline CCAF (Community College of the Air Force) degrees at these other wings," said Johnson.

Johnson feels he was awarded for working closely with the Army National Guard and setting up new initiatives to enhance Airmen's careers. He organized practice interview boards and worked with the Baltimore Orioles for a wing event at Oriole Park at Camden Yards. He also coordinated retirement seminars and improved basic morale and welfare for the wing. He has worked hard for Airmen to use the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), which allows students to take an exam to demonstrate knowledge of a subject matter and with a passing score, receive credit without taking the class.

"The biggest thing I am proud of is CLEP testing and fast tracking wing members to their Community College of the Air Force degree," he said. "An associate degree will enhance not only our members' careers but also their personal lives outside the fence."

Johnson, who previously been the 175th Maintenance Squadron first sergeant, is in his fourth year in the job. He felt working as the HRA was the next level from being a first sergeant because it allows him to direct programs at the wing level. Even though he finds it logistically tough, he finds it "easy because of the love of the job."

Because of time restraints of a traditional guard drill weekend, he works with a lot of groups on base: the Chief's Council, First Sergeant Council, Junior Enlisted Council, student flight, retirees and mid-level NCOs.

"I am always looking for feedback to support all aspects of our wing members' needs," said Johnson.

overnor-elect Larry Hogan announced today during a press conference in Annapolis that he will appoint the next Adjutant General of Maryland.

Brig. Gen. Linda L. Singh will assume the duties of the 29th Adjutant General and will replace Maj. Gen. James A. Adkins who will retire from a military career that spans more than 40 years of service. She will be the first African-American and first female to serve as the Adjutant General of Maryland.

"I know that the citizens of Maryland can rest assured that General Singh is an exceptional leader and that the Military Department will continue their proud tradition of defending our great state and nation and keeping us all safe," said Adkins.

As the Adjutant General, Singh will be responsible for the daily operations of the Maryland Military Department, which includes the Maryland National Guard, Maryland Emergency Management Agency, and Maryland Defense Force.

She will be a senior advisor to the governor responsible for the readiness, administration, and training of more than 6,700 members of the Maryland Military Department. As the adjutant general, she serves as the official channel of communication between the governor and the National Guard Bureau and serves as a member of the governor's cabinet.

The Military Department has an annual combined federal and state budget of a \$314 million as it continues to support many overseas contingency operations. In addition to supporting operations in Afghanistan and Kuwait, Guard members continue to serve in Africa, Estonia, Bosnia & Herzegovina and on the southwest border with Mexico.

General Singh currently serves as Assistant Adjutant General - Army, Maryland National Guard and as the Director of Operations - Health and Public Service North America at Accenture. She received her commission in 1991 through the Maryland Military Academy's Officer Candidate School in Reisterstown, Maryland. Prior to this assignment, she served as the Chief of the Afghanistan National Security Force Development Current Operations Cross Functional Team integrated into the International Security Assistance Force Joint Command Operations Support Center.

She was responsible for developing processes and systems to track Afghanistan National Security Force growth, development and fielding in support of Commander, International Security Assistance Force established priorities for operations in a counter-insurgency environment. She provided situational awareness products to cover the day-to-day activities related to the growth and development of the Afghanistan National Security Forces. She has received many awards and decorations to include the Bronze Star Medal and the Meritorious Service Medal with 2 Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters and others.

CHANGING TIME, CHANG MARYLAND GETS

he Maryland National Guard held a historic change of command ceremony at the 5th Regiment Armory in Baltimore on Feb. 28, 2015. Maj. Gen. (MD) Linda L. Singh assumed command of the Maryland Military Department from Maj. Gen. James A. Adkins. She is the first African American and the first female to attain this position.

The ceremony also marked a change of responsibilities for the state's senior enlisted leaders: U.S. Army Command Sgt. Maj. Thomas B. Beyard replaced U.S. Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Glenn D. Hart.

Singh grew up in Frederick County and enlisted in the Army National Guard in 1981. She was commissioned as an officer after 10 years of service as an enlisted Soldier. Her career has spanned more than 30 years.

The change of command ceremony uses the passing of



the unit's colors (flag) to represent passing on the command of the Maryland Military Department. The outgoing commander passes the flag to the state governor, which represents relinquishing the command. Then the governor passes the flag to the incoming commander to represent entrusting the responsibility of the role.

"When I think about the journey that we have ahead of us, it is going to be tough, and it is going to be challenging," Singh said. "I think you can expect me to be tough and to be challenging, but I will always smile."

The change of responsibility ceremony is very similar to the change of command ceremony, but a sabre (sword) is passed between the enlisted leaders instead of the colors.

After the ceremonies, Maryland Governor Lawrence Hogan commented on the retiring Adkins and the future command of Singh.

"Now he has some pretty big shoes to fill, but I am confident that we found the right leader to fill those shoes," Hogan said. "I could not be more proud of our appointment of Maj. Gen. Linda Singh as our new adjutant general."



he Maryland Army National Guard's C Co.,

1st Battalion, 169th Aviation Regiment collaborated with active duty Tactical Combat Casualty Care (TCCC) instructors from Walter Reed National Military Medical Center (WRNMMC) during a medic sustainment training event held at Weide Army Airfield in Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and at other locations in the Edgewood area from Feb. 5-6, 2015.

As part of a monthly partnership, the pilots and flight crew in C Co. facilitate WRNMMC military personnel by providing suitable locations, nine-line MEDEVAC support, and familiarization to aircrafts in order to successfully run a TCCC training cycle. The instructors from WRNMMC teach TCCC to service members and civilians throughout the Department of Defense and other federal agencies.

"We coordinated with this National Guard unit here in order to facilitate medical evacuation assets with our trauma lanes," said Staff
Sgt. Daniel Burke, an instructor with WRNMMC.

Even though the MDARNG facilitated this joint operation, C Co. 1-169th flight crew was able to go through sustainable training as well. Guard pilots were also able to receive flight time, which can be beneficial for their career.



"For Charlie company 1-169th, this exercise is helping them do training progression for not only their pilots but also their crew members," said Maj. Teresa M. Parrotta, instructor pilot with C Co. 1-169th. "The medics on the ground were getting the benefit value of running through the nineline and familiarization of the aircraft because a lot of them have never been around a UH-60 (Blackhawk helicopter) or any other aircraft."

PAO: Sgt. Skelton, how long have you been in the Maryland National Guard?

Skelton: I actually just did an IST (Interstate Transfer) in October of 2103 to the Maryland Guard, but I've in the National Guard since 2005.

PAO: And what do you do in the Maryland National Guard?

Skelton: I'm a 68X, a behavioral health technician.

PAO: What do you do in the civilian world?

Skelton: I'm a psychologist at the University Counseling Center at George Washington and I'm the veteran services coordinator. I specialized in working with



people that could be National Guard members, the reserve component, students who are currently enrolled, veteran students who are complete separated, some of the ROTC (Reserve Officers' Training Course) students, as well as dependents. I'm also working with the American Foundation of Suicide Prevention and doing some classes in the community here as well in Maryland.

PAO: How much schooling did you have to go through in order to become a professional psychologist?

Skelton: I did an associate degree in liberal arts, so that's two years, and then I did a bachelor's degree in psychology, which is another two years. Then I went through a masters program, which is another two years, and then I went through a doctorate, which is four years of academic work.



PAO: Was your schooling a factor in what you wanted to do in the National Guard?

Skelton: No, it was just something that I wanted to do with enlisted Soldiers. I really enjoy working with enlisted. I love being able to train them and mentor them about what our job looks like within a National Guard unit. This is something that I always loved doing. Often times I felt like I had an advantage by being enlisted because Soldiers would trust me and come to me more than some of our behavior health officers.

PAO: Other than being able to relate to Soldiers, do you feel you have contributed to the Maryland Guard with your expertise?

Skelton: I think so. From my understanding, my position in the aviation unit is fairly new. Within the few months since I've been there I've had lots of conversations with the medical team about what we want our behavior health section to look like. We started to add behavior health to the PHA (Periodic Health Assessment) so we can really integrate mental health as part of the physical well-being and look at it more holistically. I think [that] will be a really big part of reducing stigma and getting people to look at mental health as being a part of their physical health as well. I've also been able to cofacilitate suicide prevention classes and I'm a DOD (Department of Defense) certified victim advocate.

PAO: As a teacher in the Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) course what do you thing Soldiers will get out of it?

Skelton: Yeah it's a great course. I think it really challenges our Soldiers to think outside of the box. Do trainings that are different than what we have been doing in the past and ... how we're looking at suicide and what we're doing to prevent and intervene.

PAO: Growing up, did you always have intentions on working with Soldiers and veterans?

Skelton: I didn't. I think after 9/11 happened and as I was growing in the field it was something that kind of came up. I knew I wanted to provide quality mental health care to Service members. I think the passion only really came after I put on the uniform. So that's something that I've kind of grown with. It's been a really interesting and great journey to be able to come up in the mental health care world on the civilian side at the same time that I've grown in uniform on the mental health care side as well.

PAO: So you get the best of both worlds, so to speak?

Skelton: Yeah, I think I'm pretty fortunate that whatever I do in the civilian side helps me in uniform and whatever do in uniform helps me in the civilian side and so I really get to see the advantage of doing both parts of that.



Chief Warrant Officer 2 Jerry S. Goodwin awarded Purple Heart

ore than six years after a blast wave from an exploding 107mm rocket threw him violently to the ground in Iraq, retired Chief Warrant Officer 2 Jerry S. Goodwin was awarded the Purple Heart today during a ceremony at the 5th Regiment Armory in Baltimore. Goodwin, who was deployed with Maryland's 58th Infantry Brigade Combat Team in 2007, was blown to the ground when the rocket impacted approximately 20 meters from his position. After first rendering aid to his fellow Soldiers, Godwin was then treated for his own injuries, which included Traumatic Brain Injury and hearing loss as a result of the blast. The U.S. Army has since retroactively authorized concussion and brain injuries as eligible for the medal. The Purple Heart is one of the most recognized and respected medals awarded to U.S. Service members. It is ranked immediately behind the Bronze Star Medal in order of precedence.

SONS OF THE AMEI HONORS MD GUARD

aryland National Guardsmen attended the Annual George Washington Birthday Luncheon hosted by the Maryland Society Sons

of the American Revolution today to

receive a prestigious award known as the Maryland 400 Distinguished Service Medal.

Amongst the award recipients were Army Staff Sgt.
Amber Insley, 1st Sgt. Robert Schmidt, Spec. Benjamin
Wertz, Air Force Tech Sgt. Charles Doran, and Senior
Master Sgt. David Herpel. The Maryland 400 Distinguished
Service Medal is unique given Maryland is the only State in
the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution that has
a specific medal honoring the National Guard.

The Maryland 400 Distinguished Service Medal, first awarded in 1936 at Fort Indiantown Gap, Pa., was given to Md. Guardsmen for general excellence based on dependability, cooperation, leadership, patriotism, and intelligence. These medals were awarded annually until 1940, when the National Guard was called into active federal service for World War II. It wasn't until 2009, when the medals were rediscovered, that Maryland National Guardsmen once again began receiving this award based on conspicuous distinguished service or achievement.

According to MDSSAR, the medal represents an American soldier in the uniform of the Continental Army with musket and bayonet used by the Maryland 400 in the

Battle of Long Island pressing forward under the shield of a militant America mantled in the flowing folds of a star-spangled banner, in her left hand a shield to protect her children, in her right a sword for those who would destroy her faith. At the bottom is, "August – 27 – 1776", the date of the battle when Maryland's 400 saved Washington's Army at Gowanus Creek.

"It's important to the Sons of the American Revolution to recognize the service of those in uniform today as they carry on the traditions of service and sacrifice dating back to 1776", said Maj. Gen. (Retired) James A. Adkins, former Maryland National Guard adjutant general.

Adkins served as the guest speaker during the ceremony and emphasized the importance of the Maryland 400 at the Battle of Long Island, August 27, 1776.

Douglas Favorite, MDSSAR President, and Brig. Gen. Jeffrey Kramer, Md. National Guard Director of Joint Staff, presented the award to each recipient.

"This is critical to the MDSSAR as we recognize our history is full of people who have fought for our freedom and liberty", Favorite said. "The people we recognize today are doing the same in a different way and we must keep the spirit alive and keep it going."

Staff Sgt. Amber Insley, a training specialist with the 115th Military Police Battalion, reflected on what receiving this award meant to her.



Lt. Col. Mary Staab and Sgt. First Class Anthony McGrath were in attendance to show their support for Staff Sgt. Insley during the award ceremony.












MDNG SIGNAL COMPANY GETS FIRST DIBS ON COMMUNICATION

UPGRADE

he Maryland Army National Guard's Company C (Signal) of the 29th Infantry Division was the first unit in the Army to field and train on the latest tactical network at the Military Reservation in Pikesville Md., Jan. 14, 2015.

Known as the Warfighter Information Network-Tactical Increment 1 (WIN-T Inc 1), it provides Soldiers at the battalion level and above with a high-capacity voice, data and video communications.

This networking system has been a major support for over 94 percent of the Army and National Guard's tactical network and a full range of military operations since 2004.

"It's about getting better communication to the Guard," said Maj. Gen. Daniel P. Hughes, program executive officer for command, control, communications-tactical. "This really will increase the ability of this unit to support the nation in the fight or even support the governor."

Hughes said the new upgrades on the WIN-T Inc 1 would allow faster responses when there are natural disasters and the Maryland National Guard is needed to support its citizens.

"Look what happened to Hurricane Sandy on the coast of New Jersey,

there are places right now that don't have basic services. The Guard's critical mission in the state is now enhanced greatly. It's great to have the Guard getting [this] first," Hughes said.

The four modernizations to the WIN-T Inc 1 networks are: End Of Life Technical Refresh (EOL Tech Refresh), the WIN-T Inc 1b Upgrade, Network operations (NetOps) Convergence Upgrade, and the High Capacity Line Of Sight (HCLOS) Radio upgrade.

The EOL upgrades include new commercial hardware and software components such as routers, switches, servers and firewalls. The new products reduce size, weight and power (SWaP) by combining capabilities that once required their own hardware on virtualized servers.

The EOL also enables the Army to reduce the number of required Increment 1 transit cases by one third, shedding 1,000 cases over the next three years, and reduces the weight of the remaining cases.

The WIN-T Inc 1b upgrade adds the Network Centric Waveform (NCW) modem that takes advantage of NCW, a dynamic waveform that optimizes bandwidth and satellite utilization. Another key attribute of the NCW is that it enables Soldiers to send all information across the battlefield securely.

"The 1b allows us to do a number of different things," said Lt. Col Joel

Babbitt, product manager for WIN-T Increment 1. "It makes the Increment 1 a Swiss Army knife of communications. We could put Top Secret traffic through it; we could commercial traffic through it like we're doing right now for Operations United Systems in West Africa for Ebola response.

The NetOps Convergence Upgrade simplifies and reduces the number of network management tools that communications officers use to manage the tactical communications network.

And finally, the HCLOS radio upgrade provides more than a fourfold increase in throughput, enabling higher-data applications such as full-motion video, high definition video teleconferencing, and network convergence.

Twelve National Guardsmen within this Maryland-based signal company have the privilege to learn, utilize and to train their fellow Soldiers on the new the WIN-T upgrades.

"Some of the other Soldiers couldn't make the training today, so moving forward we're going to have to get them up to speed, just in case one of us is out," said Sgt. Dewayne Carruth, a nodal network systems operatormaintainer, with the 29th Inf. Div.

An aggressive fielding schedule is planned to rapidly bring this new equipment capability to all Army WIN-T 1 units by the end of 2017.

Mason said Zion United Church of Christ, a Partners in Care congregation located in Baltimore, contributed all of the food provided.




