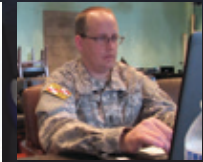
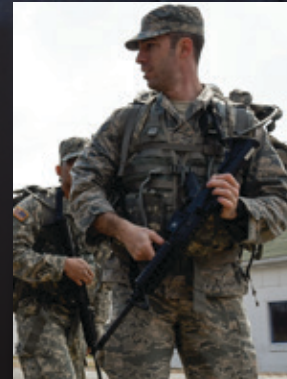



Flying missions - MD Air National Guard

As we move into 2019, the MDANG is focused on retaining the state’s flying capabilities. In 2014 and again in 2015, Congress delayed the divestiture of A-10 aircraft from the Air Force inventory. While the final decision for the A-10 aircraft resides in Congress, the Air Force Fiscal Year 20 Program Objective Memorandum reduces the A-10 inventory from 281 to 218 and decreases the number of combat squadrons from nine to six. The MDANG has been identified as one of the squadron reductions. Concurrently, the MDANG has been identified by the Air Force to gain a C-130J squadron following the departure of the A-10. The FY20 POM submission is counter to the FY19 National Defense Allocation Act which states sustainment of the 281 A-10 aircraft helps to meet Air Force fighter aircraft capacity requirements and directs the Air Force to retain the current inventory until approximately CY 2030. Given this, the 175th Wing should retain the A-10 mission until the divestiture decision is finalized. However, this risks reassignment of the C-130Js currently earmarked for the MDANG to another unit. To retain vital force structure and flying mission capabilities in Maryland, it is a priority to retain the A-10s in the 175th Wing until the divestiture decision is final, and to add the C-130Js earmarked for delivery to the MDANG.

Benefits and facilities - MD Army National Guard

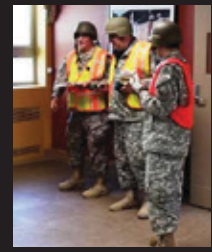
The MDARNG provides a professionally trained and equipped force for federal missions and state emergency response. The MDARNG leverages federal and state education benefits to recruit and train experts across a wide range of military and civil competencies including cyber, aviation, and logistics. Retaining excellent benefits, supporting individual growth and leader development opportunities, and improving the quality of membership are vital to attracting and retaining talented individuals to serve. The MDARNG’s capital investment strategy combines federal and state resources that are essential to maintain, improve, and construct the facilities needed to support a modern response force and the communities we serve.

Implement the Maryland Emergency Management System - MEMA

The Maryland Emergency Management System is the state’s comprehensive system for ensuring that agencies and stakeholders can work together to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond, and recover from incidents, emergencies, and disasters. This will be accomplished through the development of operational plans for Consequence Management and Disaster Risk Reduction and policies, programs, and projects within both of these focus areas.

Expand current capabilities - Maryland Defense Force

The Maryland Defense Force continues to assess their current capabilities to ensure that they are properly aligned to support the other pillars of the Maryland Military Department. This assessment will help advance credentialing, recruitment needs, and training requirements. It will also improve the MDDF’s ability to respond to requests for mission support for the department and the community.

FISCAL IMPACT

Federal vs. State Expenditures

The Maryland National Guard receives funds from the Department of the Army, Department of the Air Force, Department of Homeland Security, and the state of Maryland. State funds cover the salaries of state regular and contract employees, and supports maintenance and repair of department facilities. Additionally, the state provides funds for the Veterans' Honor Guard, tuition assistance for Guard members, and the Freestate Challenge program. Federal support to the Military Department is significant, as shown on subsequent pages. These expenditures, which have a statewide economic impact, cover pay and allowances, training, supplies, equipment, and construction. It includes some operational funding for MEMA by the Department of Homeland Security. Page 7 shows estimates, by county, of the salaries of Guard members who live or work there.

The MDNG receives federal funds in three basic appropriations:

Military Personnel

Includes pay, authorized allowances, uniforms and individual equipment, disability benefits, bonuses, and related expenses for personnel in connection with active duty, active duty for training (two week annual training), and inactive duty training (drill weekends).

Operations and Maintenance

Includes activities involved in the administration of the National Guard, training of units, procurement of organizational equipment, supplies, repair parts, services, equipment maintenance, and activities in connection with military support to civil authorities. This appropriation also includes full-time staff payrolls.

Construction

Includes National Guard facility construction, sustainment, restoration, and modernization, facilities procurement, and related items. While providing readiness centers is principally a state responsibility, federal funds are appropriated for construction and upgrade of facilities to support the federal missions of the National Guard.

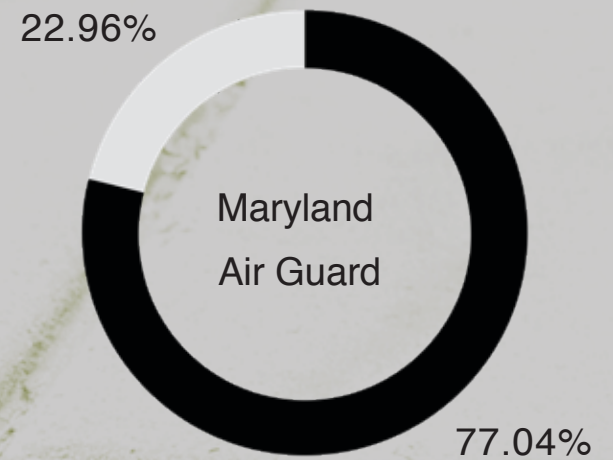

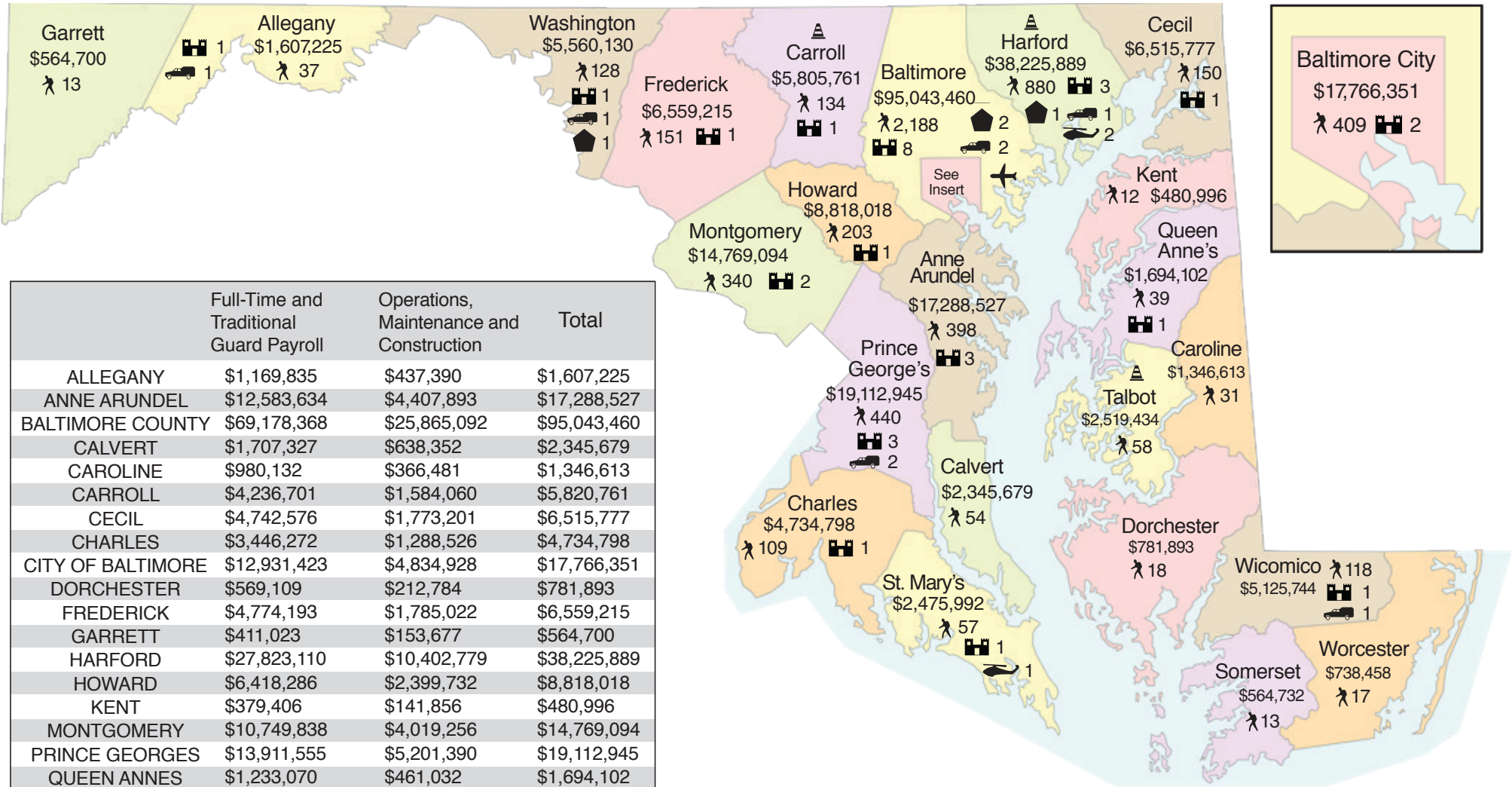

Recently Completed Capital Projects

Havre de Grace Readiness Center

The Maryland National Guard completed the construction of the Havre de Grace Readiness Center in Havre de Grace, Maryland, with a ribbon cutting scheduled for October 2018. The facility costs \$17.4 million, including \$13.05 million in federal funding and \$4.35 million in state funding. It replaced an assortment of poorly configured buildings, originally built to support the Havre de Grace Horse Track, ranging in age from 31 years old to 92 years old.

Programmed Future Facilities Projects

Easton Readiness Center

The project broke ground in June 2017. The new construction cost \$18.4 million, including of \$14.9 million in federal funding and \$3.5 million in state funding. The new construction replaces a readiness center that was 41 years old. Construction is well under way with an anticipated completion in early 2019.

MDANG Cyber-Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Center

The facility is currently under construction at Warfield Air National Guard Base. The new construction is at a cost of \$12.1 million in federal funding. The anticipated opening is early 2019.

MDANG Network Warfare Center

The facility is estimated to cost \$6 million in federal funding. A facility ground breaking ceremony occurred in November 2017. The facility is being constructed on Fort Meade near the U.S. Cyber Command. The anticipated opening is Spring 2019.

Freedom Readiness Center

The new construction, in Sykesville, Maryland cost \$30.1 million, including \$22.8 million in federal funding and \$8.5 million in state funding. The construction replaces a readiness center that is 65 years old and a second readiness center that is 61 years old.

Maryland Emergency Management Agency Headquarters

A modernization and expansion project at a cost of \$13.4 million in state funding is planned for 2020. The modernized facility will be able to support MEMA's current size and mission which has expanded since original building.

Combined Support Maintenance Shop

New construction will cost of \$20 million, comprising of \$15 million in federal funding and \$5 million in state funding. This is phase one of a two phase project. It will replace a cominded support maintenance shop that operates in an assortment of poorly configured buildings ranging from 31 to 92 years old. Project design is anticipated to begin in 2019.

We are an organization of excellence, embedded in our communities and focused on improving security, safety, and support to all citizens. We man, equip, train, and sustain the force to mobilize when ordered to federal service by the president, and provide support to civil authorities during state emergencies as directed by the adjutant general.

The 729th Quartermaster Composite Supply Company converted seawater into drinking water during the relief efforts in Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria.

The Army Aviation Support Facility and units from the 29th Combat Aviation Brigade passed the Army's rigorous Aviation Resources Management Survey.

The MDARNG validated its ability to support state emergencies in the Exercise Vigilant Guard in May.

MDARNG units successfully deployed the first MDNG Unclassified Production Analysis and Dissemination team during Vigilant Guard.

The MDARNG hosted the Best Warrior Competition, where soldiers, airmen, and members from our State Partnership nations, competed. Spc. Gerald Villamar came in third at the national competition.

All major commands in the MDARNG participated in Exercise Cyber Blitz, demonstrating their ability to defend against cyber intrusions.

We are a volunteer, uniformed component of the Maryland Military Department, authorized by Maryland law. The MDDF provides trained and competent personnel with professional and technical skills that augment the MDNG in its state mission and support its mobilization to and redeployment from, federal missions.





MDDF Engineers conducted tree removal operations at the Camp Fretterd Military Reservation saving thousands of dollars.

In fiscal year 2018, MDDF members volunteered more than 26,000 hours, saving the state more than \$1.5 million.

The MDDF implemented the same physical fitness requirement equivalent to the Army height/weight standards.

In November an Officer Development Program was instituted to train non-prior military service members.

The MDDF updated its website to focus on recruiting news members.

The MDDF adopted a web-based data management system from the California State Defense Force to support publishing orders, strength reports, awards, man-hours, training, and records.

The MDDF developed a professional ethics policy focused on four core principles loyalty, professionalism, honesty, and competency.

The MDDF Cyber held a workshop at the Maryland Association of Counties Conference in Ocean City to enhanced awareness on cyber threats.

The MDDF continues to provide support to the Freestate Challenge Academy with in-processing of new cadets and conducted classes on financial management.

The 10th Medical Regiment developed and implemented a self-health assessment for all members.

We serve as the Joint Force Headquarters for Maryland and assist the adjutant general in exercising authority and direction over assigned and attached organizations of the Maryland Military Department in order to accomplish its state and federal missions.





The Joint Staff participated in Exercise Vigilant Guard, a national level exercise. This exercise provided the opportunity to develop, refine, and rehearse policies and procedures to request and exercise Dual Status Commander Authority and request and employ Emergency Management Assistance Compact agreements with other states.

The Joint Staff supported a regional level Defense Support to Civil Authority response to Hurricane Florence in North and South Carolina. The MDNG provided aviation and public affairs assets to the affected region.

The Counterdrug Aviation Detachment conducted operations with the District of Columbia's Drug Enforcement Agency field office to assist with ongoing narcotics investigations in Prince Georges County.

Criminal analysts assisted Maryland State Police in the dismantling of a major drug trafficking organization operating in Anne Arundel County. Results included 14 arrests and the seizure of five vehicles, \$50,000 in cash, and over 600 grams of heroin/fentanyl.

Members of the 32nd Civil Support Team planned, coordinated and conducted a joint training exercise focused on maritime response alongside our local, state and federal partners.

The 32nd CST underwent their Training and Proficiency Evaluation, by U.S. Army North. The CST responded to two separate Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosive incidents in which all 12 unit key collective tasks were evaluated each day.

The 32nd CST partnered with the Baltimore County Police Bomb Squad to conduct interagency training in order to develop joint entry tactics and techniques utilizing each other's personnel.

STATE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Maryland maintains partnerships with Estonia, since 1993, and Bosnia and Herzegovina, since 2003, as part of the initial outreach by the United States toward new democracies in Central and Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. The partnership program emphasizes civil and military cooperation with civil control of a professional military. Maryland has a key role in this international initiative to foster democracy, encourage market economies and promote regional cooperation and stability.

The MDNG hosted AF BiH members during annual training events with the 32nd Civil Support Team.

Senior enlisted leaders of the MDARNG shared their knowledge with AF BiH noncommissioned officers on NATO support staff functions, practices, and procedures to operate in international and interagency environments across the full spectrum of military operations.

Nine members from our state partners were integrated as a part of our Joint Staff in Exercise Vigilant Guard.

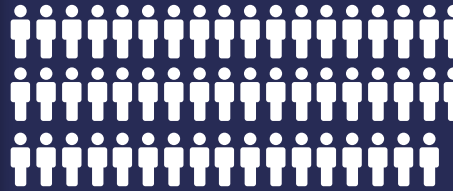

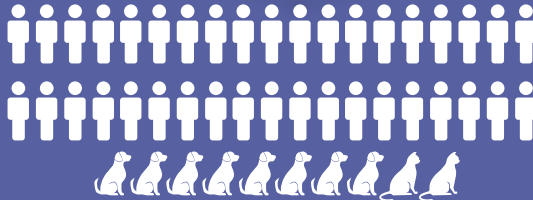
